


To help with fund-raising the club have set up a

A Miners' Memorial?

To have been a coal miner is to be a member of a special breed. To have been wife or child of a miner is to know intimately the demands put on him and to live with the anxiety intrinsic to the real dangers of mining. I know



only from what I have read and heard of what it took to work in a pit, the heat, the dust, the noise, the physical graft, the ever-present threats of gas, water and collapses, all taken for granted as the miner went off to his daily stint. Disaster always lurked. There is a poignant, harrowing aerial photograph of families waiting for news of loved ones at the Gresford Pit in 1934 when 266 men were lost. I have heard people in St Martins tell of the loss of fathers of young children and of the toll life in the pit took on health and lifespan.

Until 1968 St. Martin's was a mining community. It had been so since 1913 and the



evidence of Ifton Colliery prevails. There is still a Miners' Institute, and there are some mementoes in mine trucks on the green opposite Stan's supermarket and at the entrance to Ifton Meadows. The brass band has its roots in the mining community. There is a Colliery Road. The sense of community in St.Martins, intangible, yet something to be

seen and felt in the exchanges among folk in Stan's, in pubs, churches and in myriad daily encounters, derives from the mutual support so central to the life of the miner.

2018 will be the 50th anniversary of the closing of Ifton Colliery. It closed because its steep seams were too susceptible to fire and therefore deemed to be uneconomic. The impact of the closure on the village was sharp and dramatic as was to be expected. The village has recovered, of course, as has the landscape, and the pit site has evolved into other sources of production and employment. But, there remains little that reminds of the life of the miner. We want to redress this and to have something that is not only a reminder, but a tribute to the men whose lives were given to keep industry moving and to keep us warm and illuminated in our homes. Especially, we would like to remember and celebrate the place of the mine and the miners in St. Martin's by erecting a statue to mark the anniversary. Preliminary steps have been taken to consider designs and to find what funds will be needed. Once this has been established the fund-raising effort will begin. More later. Don Borland


It's time to dig out our heavy fluorescent coats and soon

Wild Reading?

Wild or Shared Reading has been happening in Oswestry and you may well wonder what it is. The idea is inspired by The Reader Organisation, a registered charity

based in Liverpool, who have been doing it for several years and have groups all over the UK and rapidly spreading to Europe. It comes from a belief that good literature connects us to others because it expresses certain truths about what it is to be human. In realising that we are not alone in our thoughts and feelings, we can connect better with others and have the confidence to make changes if we wish.



Here in Oswestry, smallish groups of about 10 or 12 people get together, the group leader selects a short story or an extract from a novel and copies are brought along for everyone. The story is then read aloud, initially by the group leader although others may read out if they want to, but there is however no obligation to speak at all. The important thing is that everyone is following the story by listening together. Typically the piece is broken down into separate sections, allowing time for members to discuss any thoughts they may have about the piece - this might be reflections or memories, whatever comes to mind.

A poem is then read, which will have some connection to the story. Sessions last about 90 minutes.

Shared reading groups are run across the country - from London to Newcastle, in North Wales and in Devon.

Groups are run in a variety of settings, from community centres to formal institutions such as schools, old people's homes, hospitals, prisons, cafes and, as in our case, pubs and outdoors. Research done by Liverpool University suggests that in addition to the simple enjoyment of reading a good story or poem, there can be other benefits of sharing which contribute to a greater sense of well-being. It is free to attend. The next Wild Reading will be on Apple Day October 15th in The Bailey Head Pub,

Bailey Head, Oswestry at 1:00-2:30.



We are two weeks into our exciting new academic year and already students and staff are working hard and focused on the year ahead.

We became an academy on the 1st September following a lot of hard work behind the scenes over the holidays. This means we are now part of the Priory School Trust. Michael Barratt, Principal of the Trust, has already been in to meet staff and students and has started working with the senior leadership team. Primary students have met him in their lessons and secondary students in assembly time.



We are very lucky to have the support of Michael and the team at The Priory, with its stunning academic achievements and also the continuing support of the number one non selective private school in the country Moreton Hall.

The support from Moreton Hall will continue in many ways, including our top set scientists and mathematicians in years 10 and 11 having lessons in their fabulous facilities. This year, six girls have gone from us to study at Moreton Hall for their sixth form studies on a special bursary agreement.



Our exam results at key stage 4 were fabulous and showed a huge improvement for many subject areas. 73% of our students met the government progress target in English and there was a 15% improvement in Science and further improvements in Maths. Our brighter students performed particularly well, some of them adding to their government target grades by 2 GCSE grades. In some subjects 100% of students made the government progress target.

Our family ethos and special relationships between our students and staff permeates every aspect of our school and we are very excited about the journey ahead.



Our open day and evening on the 11th of October will showcase the whole school from reception to year 11. If you are a prospective year 7 parent or if you are a current parent that hasn't visited the school please come and see the fantastic changes we have made to our school.
