the outside world in a week. These roles, along with many others, exist right here in the local community and we are looking for volunteers to help this winter.



## WHAT'S IN A ? NAME:

'Sticks and stones will hurt my bones but names will never hurt me!' we used to reply to those who called us insulting names. On the other hand we do all feel something about our names and to a greater or smaller extent are defined by them. I am known by family and friends as 'Don' (or Dad

or Grandad and so on) and I'm comfortable with that. I was christened 'Donald Fergus', both of which names have implications for me. There's a formality about Donald and use of it to me could mean that someone doesn't know me, or is attempting to be overfamiliar when they don't know me. It could also mean, with rising intonation on the second syllable that I was in trouble with mother and that I'd better watch out. Also, currently it is associated with an eminent political figure whose values, outlook and policies are not at all in tune with mine. Far better to recall what it meant as a child to have the same name as the best batsman ever, Don Bradman (whom I saw at Old Trafford in 1948). Fergus, a family name derived from Scottish forebears, gave me trouble in earlier life, being called 'Fungus' at school and Fergoid among some 'friends' later in life. Now, I'm proud of it and don't care what anyone attempts to do with it. As for my surname, it is relatively unusual and means that, instinctively, I spell it out when I am asked for it.

As parents I wonder what notice we take of the lifelong consequences of the names we give to our children. There is a host of reasons, motives, for bestowing (saddling?) them with names that have meaningful associations for the parent but which fade with time. They could have literature as source (Ophelia Jones?), sport (eleven 'first' names to chime with the Liverpool team?), biblical origins (Eli Ramsbottom?), botany (there's a male character in a Victorian book called Lupin), zoology (Tiger Woods and Peregrine Worsthorne), though I haven't yet heard of anyone called Sloth. On the other hand there are Crocodile Dundee and Speedy Gonzales, but so far as I know no-one has been named after them.

My point is, as I have said, that our names have consequences for us in ways that parents maybe could have foreseen but, in the glow of delight with the newborn, did not think it through. We may find them embarrassing, irksome, associated with people or happenings that have become distant and lost meaning. Equally, they could have the most positive of associations, a genuine pleasure to carry on a name that is inherited from a treasured grandparent. Choosing a name seems to me to be a delicate business. I know of people who have dispensed with a first given name and come to be known by the second one and another who assumed a new identity by changing to a completely different name, the first name because he liked it and the second because it was the name of friend admired at school. The reasons for doing so were not simply dissatisfaction with the original name, but a rebellion against what it signified, an extreme example but a poignant illustration of lifelong ramifications of a given name.

So, if you have in mind, for the sake of, say, originality and a search for early distinction, maybe giving the bright new offspring a name like Hypericum Platypus could be a step too far. Just a thought. (And my Dad would, quite regularly, call me 'Sam'. I never knew why but it felt affectionate and warm and I answered to it.)



## Three Parishes Big Local Update St Martins School Saver Club


