Being on a Parish Council, one learns to listen and accept the views of others; one may agree to disagree, but democracy prevails through majority decision. Parish Councillors have their own opinions but essentially they represent the opinions of local villagers. We have a vacancy and I am encouraging any community minded person to consider applying to be a Parish Councillor. That quote is applicable to all levels of government and, as the old maxim says, 'If you want to change the rules of the game, get out of the spectator stand and get onto the pitch', so if you want to affect change in village life, then become a player on the Parish Council team. Please email Edward the Parish Clerk to let him know of your interest.

• "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (Jesus, John 15:13). War is abhorrent and will never go away whilst injustice, revenge, and hatred abide within the human heart. We are approaching the 100th Anniversary of the end of the Great War of 1914-1918. We will be having our Remembrance Service at the War Memorial, Sunday 11th November.

• The Parish Council organised for the War Memorial to be cleaned – you may have noticed it now looks a different colour. We are not finished our restoration work and Councillor Hayball is working with the Parish Clerk to see if the names can be made clearer. This is specialist work and will take some time.

• Finally, "To be, or not to be?" wrote William Shakespeare when referring to Hamlet's dilemma about life, the universe, and everything. Bill continued, "...that is the question". Too often questions get rude replies: '20mph speed limit in the village?' Fill in your own response. 'Cattle grazing on Ifton Meadows?' Fill in your own response. Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

The September Parish Council Meeting was held in the Moors Community Centre. There is now a vacancy on the parish council following the resignation of Ashley Allum. Notices will be put up advertising this vacancy.

The Chairman said that the hanging baskets, which this year were the best they had been thanks to the planting by Neil Rheade and the frequent watering by Huw Manford, will now be taken down during the coming weeks.

Concern was again expressed over vehicles speeding through the village. Several Councillors and residents have now put their names forward to take part in a Community Speed Watch Scheme although issues around the mini roundabout by Stans Superstore are still ongoing and we are waiting for a report from our Shropshire Councillor Steve Davenport on proposed new designs for this area. Steve Davenport is still looking at a trial 20 mph scheme in the village although some feedback from residents has suggested extending the speed limit on all main roads into the village should be considered instead.

PCSO Pete Roberts reported on the crime figures for July and August. He added that they had been out on a number of occasions with their speed gun along Overton Road. Councillors felt more police presence was required outside the school at the start and end of the school day as more and more vehicles are now parking on the grass verges on either side of the entrance to the school. On a question of police numbers, and a report that more officers are planned for the West Mercia area, Councillors want to know what impact this would have, if any, in our area.

Planning applications for the erection of commercial building and external yard area for B1, B2 and B8 use on Plot 2, at Bank Top Industrial Estate, St Martins; Erection of replacement dwelling following demolition of existing farmhouse and redundant farm buildings at New House Farm, Pen-Y-Bryn, St Martins and the redevelopment of New House Farm to facilitate the establishment of a commercial equine stud enterprise; and the erection of a commercial unit (B1, B2 and B8 use) on the Bank Top Industrial Estate, St Martins were all supported.

Councillors all agreed that the War Memorial Restoration Company had carried out a very good job in cleaning the War Memorial. An assessment will now be carried out to establish what further restoration work may be required and possible.


In the July Publication there was a small article titled "Is St Martins a Great Place to Live?" and I think it's great if people could add to this every month!








The former provisions store and bakery 'Ushers" at St Martins Moor Bridge has now re-opened as a 'Tea and Coffee shop'.



Nature Fun Day at Ifton Meadows Local Nature Reserve, St.Martins on Sunday 19th August, 2018.



St. Martins FC in the North West Counties Football League 2019-20

St. Martins F.C has made a creditable start to their first season the North West Counties Football League 1st Division South, even though they played five of their first seven games away from home.

Recognising the significant step that the club has climbed, Manager Dan Stevens has been modest in his pre-season expectations stating that consolidation at this high level in the immediate future would be an achievement for St. Martins F.C... Dan remains optimistic however, in spite of the cruel pre-season injuries that have struck key players Harrison Millington and Callum Graybrook, plus the frustration of waiting for international clearance for players. He has utilised the club's squad of players to manage this early absence of key players, and develop a fighting 'team spirit' that has enabled them to provide staunch opposition in every game played to date and bounce back from defeats.

After 9 league games St. Martins find them-selves in a creditable 4th place in the League, registering impressive early victories versus established North West Counties League, Clubs such as Cammell Laird (3-1), Stockport Town (2-1), Abbey Hulton (2-1) Main Road (3-2) and Wythenshawe Town (4-1).

Following impressive early victories, St. Martins F.C were facing a fourth consecutive defeat before their away game to Wythenshawe Town on Saturday 15th September. A loss to Wellington Town in the 'FA Vase', a League Cup defeat away to Nelson and a home league defeat to Eccleshall provided a bleak possibility of four defeats in a row, in light of recent mistakes that had gifted the opposition victories.

Jamie had the misfortune of scoring an own goal away to Wellington in the FA Vase on 8th Sept, but scored impressive hat-trick of penalties away to Wythenshawe Town on 15th Sept. A stunning goal by Dave Easthope and a hat-trick of penalties from Jamie Hands however, calmed the nerves of the St. Martins F.C supporters and provided relief to Manager Dan Stevens who had stated in the local paper recently, "Good sides don't lose 3 games in a week" but the Saints registered a hard fought (4-1) victory against a robust Wythenshawe Town.






Moreton Hall Student Awarded Young Speaker of the Year



<u>'Wilfred Owen: Poet of Oswestry'</u> <u>- a new book by Dave Andrews</u>

Many of us know that Wilfred Owen was born in Oswestry and that he was killed during World War One but most of us probably know very little else about him - except perhaps that he became famous as a poet after his death. Dave Andrews' new book on the town's most famous son provides a clear and concise introduction to Wilfred Owen's short but eventful life.

'I wanted to write a book that would give people the main facts about Wilfred Owen without going into great depth', says Dave. 'He deserves to be better known and better understood. I also wanted to remind the world that he was born here in Oswestry. Other places may claim him as theirs and commemorate his name, but we can all be proud of the fact that he was a native of our town, just as he himself was proud of his connection with the area and with his Welsh forefathers.'

As well as a biographical section on Wilfred, the book has separate sections on his poetic development and his Welsh identity. 'I realised that not everyone might be interested in his development as a poet,' says Dave 'so I decided to discuss this in a separate section. It will provide a solid basis for students of his work and for people who want to learn about the influences on his poetry.'

Wilfred Owen: Poet of Oswestry' has been written to coincide with the town's centenary commemorations of Wilfred's death in battle in 1918. At the time of his death, his work was virtually unknown and it was to be several years before his poetry reached a wider audience. His reputation grew steadily during the twentieth century and in particular during the 1960s. Today his poems are read and studied throughout the English speaking world and beyond it in translation. Wilfred Owen - a son of Oswestry - is now regarded as one of the greatest poets of the twentieth century in the English language.

As Dave says in the introduction to his book - 'I wish to dedicate this book to the people of Oswestry. It was you I had in mind as my potential audience while I was writing it. Wilfred Owen was born in our town and we should be proud of his achievements.'

Dave is currently Reader and Writer in Residence at Oswestry Library and holds degrees in literature from the universities of Bangor and Oxford. He has published a number of books in Welsh and English including novels and guidebooks to the mountains of Wales. His two most recent books, *The Oswestry Round* and *Gobowen to Everest*, were both written to raise money for Cancer Research UK and Lingen Davies Cancer Fund, for whom Dave is a Community Coordinator. *Wilfred Owen: Poet of Oswestry*' is Dave's tenth book.
