Our road through the village has been resurfaced, not without disruption and problems. The contractors were not the most helpful, but part of their attention to Health and Safety restrictions were because at a previous roadworks job they had two workers hospitalised, they said it was due to being helpful to adjacent home access. Nice new road surface, but what a shock to find it being dug up 4 days after completion. We were not amused, and Severn Trent have been informed of our disgust at their actions.

Coronavirus, COVID-19, rules and recommendations are changing by the hour, so just please watch out for your neighbours, ask if they want you to shop for them, and keep on washing hands, wipe door handles with anti bacterial wipes, think about taking wipes in the car with you, wipe your hands or steering wheel, shopping trolley handles, all surfaces that other people are touching, but most of all, if you get a cold or fever, stay at home.

Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

Under the public session one member of the public expressed concern over the lack of finished road surfaces in Irvine Gardens. Nick Scott from the developers had told him that they were waiting for Welsh Water to complete their work before this could be carried out. The Parish Council would contact Welsh Water for a response. He also asked for an update on the Section 106 money for this area and was advised that £55,000 would be allocated to the new village recreation ground development, with a further £26,000 for play equipment. He felt that residents of Irvine Gardens should be consulted on this as some play equipment should be on their development.

Another member of the public brought to the attention of the Parish Council the frequent flooding from Ifton Meadows into the road known as Glyn Morlas Lane. Water flows freely across the lane and vastly increases the volume of water carried by the small stream that flows along the front of Four Oaks, through Hazeldene land and into the Morlas Brook. The Parish Council supported their concerns and agreed to forward these concerns to the appropriate officers at Shropshire Council.

Shropshire Councillor Steve Davenport reported on the issues raised by the public about the resurfacing of Overton Road and his concerns that within days Severn Trent were digging the road up again.

On street lighting, all the street lights owned by the Parish Council have now been converted to LED. There are still a few teething problems with a number of these lights. Shropshire Council have reported that when contractors were undertaking the clean and test on their lights they found a number of high earth loop impedances on four columns along Ellesmere Road. For safety reasons those lights have been disconnected and a job ticket raised for the investigation and repair of the high earth loop impedances as soon as possible. They are also looking at three lights adjacent to Irvine Gardens that are not working.

On planning the Parish Council supported the erection of an outbuilding for use as dog grooming room following removal of existing shed at 16 Garden Village, St Martins, additional use of land for the siting of up to 65 shipping containers for use as self-storage and erection of security fencing at Bank Top Industrial Estate and agreed the proposed 11KV overhead electricity line rebuild on land between Chirk and Ifton.

Next Meetings; Decisions on whether the Annual Parish meeting and the Annual meeting of the Parish Council can be held as 'virtual' meetings are awaiting government

The next normal meeting of the Parish council is due to be held at St Martins Centre on Thursday 9th April at 7pm, circumstances allowing, but for further information on this, or on the delegated arrangements for Council decisions in the event of public meetings (such as Parish Council meetings) being prohibited and for updates to public information generally, please visit the Parish Council website at

FRIENDS OF IFTON MEADOWS

Following the recent storms we are at last seeing a bit of sun even if it comes with very strong winds. Since my last article the Friends have been working on removing birch Local Nature Reserve scrub from the skylark breeding area. We remove scrub so

that the area is kept clear of trees which might be used by predators who would take the skylarks and their young. Early March is the last time we can work in this area so any further work must wait until next Winter/Spring.

By the time you read this the signs asking you to keep off the mound between March and September will have been returned. PLEASE keep both yourselves and your dogs off the mound during this period - we already have two breeding pairs nesting. Just to put your minds at ease the conservation cattle ie: Dexters are not a problem for the skylarks - conservation cattle are used widely throughout the country on many sites without any problems. The main problem/danger to skylarks are PEOPLE and their DOGS that is why we ask you not to disturb them by walking over the top of the mound. The Dexters do not seem bothered by dogs or people and have proved popular with some, but I would like to remind dog owners that they must not allow their dogs to run up onto the nesting area.

Mike from Shropshire Council is trying to sort out the new kissing gates so please be patient if they are not yet finished. Both kissing gates have the same disabled access as the main entrance - a RADAR key opens the lock on the top of the gate allowing a section to open out to let a wheelchair through. If you need to use a wheelchair and do not have a RADAR key, they can be obtained from Shropshire Council (Radar keys open many doors throughout the UK including disabled toilets).

We continue to work on Second Sunday of each month 1.30 to 4 p.m. if you are interested please come and join us.

Market Intelligence Review launched:

Shropshire Council remains committed to its aspiration of enabling access to superfast broadband (30mbps) across the Council area where the broadband infrastructure market is failing to provide it. So that we can better understand current

and planned (next three years) coverage of broadband infrastructure, we've launched a Market Intelligence Review (MIR). The Review asks broadband infrastructure suppliers to provide premise-level information by the end of March 2020.

We will use this information to publish anonymised maps to show the availability of both current and planned broadband infrastructure, and to provide an update to our 2017 Coverage Map, see:

How to check superfast broadband (30mbps) availability:

Most people in the Shropshire Council area can access a superfast broadband connection from one or more of the existing broadband infrastructure networks. If your broadband speed is not as quick as you'd like, you may need to switch networks to get a faster connection.

Alsager Town 1 St. Martins 0. The opening exchanges were understandably hectic resulting in the Saints Goalie, George Austin making an outstanding save in the 25th minute and minute's later a header from Saints 'Centre back', Jeff Agyeman skimmed past the Alsager post. The Saints defended stoutly and looked dangerous from swift counter attacks led by centre forward Will Wells. Man of the match, goalkeeper George Austin kept the Saints in the game in the first half when he saved a penalty, but a free kick in the 87th minute fired into the top corner of the net captured the points for Alsager Town.

Wythenshawe Amateurs 5 St. Martins 0. The night-mare of losing continued when Saints travelled to Wythenshawe on a cold Tuesday evening. They found themselves behind after conceding a penalty in the 6th minute and went 2-0 down before half time.

Despite Saints Goalkeeper George Austin making save after save to achieve a man-of



the match award three more second half goals completed a 5-0 drumming

St. Martins 0 Wythenshawe Amateurs 3. St. Martins conceded early in the third minute of their return visit of Wythenshawe Amateurs and though the Saints fought back for 75% of the game, they were stunned by two further goals resulting in a 3-0 loss.

Barnton FC 1 St. Martins 0. This clash was a very important game as both sides currently sat in the bottom 3 of the North West Counties League Division 1 South, so both desperately required points and the subsequent manner of the game epitomised both teams' anxiety resulting in few chances throughout the game. Neither side really took control of the game, as defences dominated.

St Martins did start the quicker of the two teams with a couple of efforts going close but yet again a goal conceded just before half time proved decisive. Despite Saints man of the match, George Austin saving a penalty following two Saints players receiving $1\underline{Q}$

St. Martins FC 2 Cammell Laird 1970 0. Saints hadn't kept a clean sheet since their win on the 10th August over Cheadle Town in what was then their third consecutive win at the beginning of this season, so a very impressive 2 – 0 defeat over Cammell Laird 1970 15th Feb was received with justifiable pride, winning via two well constructed goals and keeping a clean sheet in traitorous weather conditions. This hard fought result started with Saints Keeper George Austin making an early acrobatic save and from that early warning point the Saints defence led by Jeffery Agyman were excellent throughout the game. Cammell Laird's defence was split in the 11th minute by a Saints four man counter attack of precision passes that was completed by Will Wells' calm chip into the corner of the net. Joseph Foster secured a much needed win for Saints in the 64th minute scoring his side's second - and what turned out to be the match-winning goal.

St. Martins FC 0 Vauxhall Motors 4. Following recent improved performances Saints approached this game with a higher level of confidence even though their opponents sit at the opposite end of the North West Counties League Division 1 South. The game didn't reflect that optimism with the first goal conceded in the 6th minute. Vauxhall enjoyed the majority of the possession and Saints were caught out again from a free kick in the 28th minute. St. Martins started the second half with gusto, but two late goals, the last a scrappy affair in the 89th minute, led to the final 4-0 defeat.

St. Martins FC 1 Stone Old Alleyions 4. Saints dominated possession from the



start and created chances that they didn't convert into goals until a mesmerising run from Jamie Smith in the 38th minute was concluded with a low drive from outside the box which flew into the corner of the net to give Saints a deserved lead. That lead was wiped out a minute later when Saints Keeper George Austin was adjudged to have stepped back over the line when grasping hold of Mathew Thomas's cross. This seemed to impact Saints moral and Stone scored a second goal in the 58th minute. Two further goals saw Saints lose again, this time 4-1.

Ellesmere Rangers 2 St. Martins F.C 0. Both teams have struggled this season and have found themselves languishing near the bottom of the League, so this game was very important to both clubs. A catalogue of missed chances from both clubs provides perhaps an explanation why they find themselves in this position, but painfully for the Saints the two goals they conceded were scored by Carl Bailey and Twanda Melusi, both ex-Saints players, transferred this season. Although moving Joseph Foster from wing-back to striker definitely worked it was not enough to prevent Rangers from taking the points.

Consultation on Proposed Re-development

The former Ifton Heath primary school site has, with the agreement of the Parish Council, been identified as suitable for housing and indicative plans have now been created by Cornovii Developments (Shropshire Council's new fully owned development company) who wish to share those plans with the community to gauge their reaction to them.

Following recent government guidelines surrounding the coronavirus outbreak, it will not be possible to hold a public event in the usual way. The health, safety and well-being of our staff, partners and the people of St Martins is of paramount importance to us and prevents the holding of a public display and meeting at St Martins Centre.
