

FROM THE CHAIR

Hi everyone, I feel that it is only a few days since I last compiled a letter to you all, but time stands still for no-one.

Our poppies are up, we have had our Remembrance days, and our wreaths have been laid, but still we need to remember our members of the Armed Forces, who are there for our country every day of the year. We are fortunate in our village that we are able to have a parade of young people, and have the junior school choir to join us, as by joining us they learn why we have a Remembrance Day.

St Martins Volunteers - so many of you - a Big Thank you. We have St Martins Chatter and Parish Council Facebook pages, and so many of you communicate via electronic devices, that many of us "oldies" have trouble keeping up but you all contribute to our community in so many different ways; litter pickers, picking up after others, opening doors, welcoming people, looking after a neighbour or friend, organising walks or meals for others, putting a village magazine together, growing vegetables and giving them away. There are lots of volunteers out there, THANK YOU. I often hear "they are so thoughtful" and "so kind" and there are so many of you out there.

We will be advertising for a new Parish Councillor soon, we have a vacancy, so if you have time to help us then consider joining our Parish Council.

St Martins Centre is looking for volunteers for the Centre to be open each weekday morning, for the free book library, so if you have a spare morning, like to organise books, make coffee or tea for visitors, then pop in to the Centre on a weekday morning and share your availability with whoever is there.

We aim to have the centre open 5 mornings a week, have computer drop-in sessions and group meetings, so we can become a real community hub.

Our sporting recreational facilities are moving forward; we have been given 12 acres of land by Iain Hill Trevor and Brynkinalt Estates for our future football provision, a multi use games area, and a cricket pitch, along with running track, rugby field, and archery area, so now the hard work begins. We do need to raise the funds for all this to proceed, so anyone with ideas for fundraising is invited to think of our community for the future. We have already seen Divine Escapes with a raffle in favour of the Recreation Project, so anyone with a wish to raise funds for our own locality is asked to think of The Recreation Project. The facilities will enhance school sports provision, and enable our football teams to be truly this part of

North Shropshire.

This has been a mix-up month of weather, but I have been watching the trees turn into autumnal colours, and sometimes out on my walks I enjoy kicking the fallen leaves, the colours are so varied and lovely.

Our next Parish Council meeting is December 9th, and then again January 14th. If you have any concern within the parish you are able to contact any Parish Councillor or if you wish to speak about your concern at a Parish Council meeting, then come along. 7.00pm at The Centre.

Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

At the start of September, the Parish Council were back to full strength as regards the number of filled Council Seats. However since then, Pierre Saunier has resigned from the Parish Council due to increased work commitments. This now leaves one further vacancy to fill. Further details are on the notice boards.

Despite further concerns expressed to our MP, Scottish Power and Shropshire Council (SC) regarding the outstanding faults to a number of street lights along Ellesmere Road, Shropshire Council cannot currently repair lighting at this location as they are not permitted to work on the cabling that is in place at the location. It is not possible at present to identify SC wiring and therefore wiring needs to be stripped out and replaced to enable SC to maintain. Their Street Lighting and Traffic Signals Manager has advised that they currently have a quote to replace the cabling but are securing a further quote given the high costs indicated in the first quote received. Once the second quote is received the team will be able to assess against any available budget and update the Parish Council. We continue to press SC for urgent action.

The big issue still outstanding is the proposed closure of St Martins Surgery by the current medical professionals in Chirk. We still await the results of their recent patient survey for St Martins which is now due out at the end of the November when the Chirk practice will then make a final decision on the St Martins Branch surgery.

Cornovii Developments Ltd (CDL) have now been granted planning permission to develop 35 new homes at the site in St Martins, Ifton Heath, Oswestry. Two members of the parish council and two members of the public have been appointed to sit on a Stakeholder Group to meet on a monthly basis for 18 months whilst development works are ongoing. They will support Cornovii in pre-contract matters, in particular helping to choose the build contractor, ensuring the chosen contractor delivers social value and creating a local connection criterion for the sale of new homes. This is an important group as Shropshire Council have placed 25 conditions on the approved plans which will require careful monitoring.

Around ten years ago we presented a report to Welsh Water to show that St Martins has a problem with hydraulic overflow (sewerage backflow from a combined surface water/sewerage pipe running along Overton Road in St Martins). This is now happening again. Therefore, as a matter of urgency,

the Parish Council have requested that Welsh Water install sewer monitors again in the combined surface water and sewage pipe along Overton Road. In addition, the poor condition of the road surface and an increase of HGV's using Overton Road could also be adding to the condition of the pipe running through the centre of the village.

The Parish Council, through Shropshire Council, have set up a small working group to adopt a Climate and Ecological Emergency forum. Areas to be considered include reducing net carbon emissions, undertake a carbon footprint assessment of St Martins, and support and work with Shropshire Council and all other relevant agencies on initiatives towards making the entire Parish environmentally sustainable.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held in St Martins Centre at 7.00pm on Thursday 9th December 2021.

GOOSE INCARNATION

There was once a man who didn't believe in God, and he didn't hesitate to let others know how he felt about religion and religious holidays, like Christmas. His wife, however, did believe, and she raised their children to also have faith in God and Jesus, despite his comments.



One snowy Christmas Eve, his wife was taking their children to a Christmas Eve service in the farm community in which they lived. She asked him to come, but he refused.



Police Report

Since the last article we have seen Halloween and Bonfire night both passing peacefully in St Martins. Christmas is going to be upon us again before we know it.

West Mercia Police will be launching its annual Christmas drink/drug drive campaign in December, so please use a nominated driver and beware of the effects of alcohol the morning after. With new trends being identified and reported nationally, we are asking everyone to be vigilant with the new threat of being spiked with needles.



Operation SNAP

Using the Operation Snap web portal, members of the public can report and submit (via a secure online External Link) digital footage showing potential traffic offences. This can range from driving dangerously or carelessly to overtaking on solid white lines, using a mobile phone while driving, ignoring traffic lights or dangerous driving around other road users, such as horse riders and cyclists. Submissions are sent to West Mercia Police where the evidence will be reviewed by one of our experienced road policing police officers. Offenders are prosecuted when the evidence is appropriate. Any footage submitted through the portal can also be used by us to help educate other road users and to advise on case results.

St Martins Parish Council is taking it very seriously

St Martins Parish Council will undertake the Carbon Literacy Project to make sure every decision made is in the best interests of increasing biodiversity and reaching our target of net zero carbon emissions by 2030 <u>saveourshropshire.org</u>

How our lives will be fundamentally changed in St Martins as a result of climate change and ecological collapse, if we carry on with the average British lifestyle shropshire-gov.uk/shropshire-climate-action:

- Biodiversity and habitat loss
- Increased frequency of heat waves
- We'll need to allow for increased summer cooling without using air conditioning units, e.g. using mechanical ventilation, heat recovery (MVHR) and reversible heat pumps
- Water shortages
- Failure of local and global food supply chains supermarket failure and local agriculture becomes increasingly challenging
- Increased local flooding
- Social care costs increase, with health and wellbeing impacts on both young and old people
- Healthcare costs to the NHS increase exponentially and local hospitals and GP surgeries struggle to cope

I wrote last month saying we could look forward to the fungi coming - well nature certainly has provided us with an explosion of colour and shape from the normal to the bright yellow of wax caps and the purple of the Amethyst Deceiver, so keep your eyes open when you are walking on site and if

possible take a picture and put them on our Facebook page (it is easy to join) and could you give either a rough idea where

you saw it or use your phone and let us have the g.p.s. coordinates so we can record where it is. Do not worry if you cannot ID the fungi, we can make enquiries from someone who does.



Mike-(Shropshire council) has been on site with his new flail cutter taking out the scrub which is taking over the skylark mound - a brilliant machine would have taken the friends days to have done the amount that he removed in minutes. Thanks Mike and also Lee who arrived with a small tractor with a larger flail on the back to cut back the thicker trees. Shows how scrub can take over this area in just a short time and then there would be NO skylarks.

They will grow again but hopefully with the help of the cattle we can keep it under control.

Unfortunately I must return to the problem of dog fouling - I have been informed that the Horse field is becoming unsuitable for events due to IRRESPONSIBLE dog owners, so please do not let your dogs run loose in this area unless you clean up after them.

Friends of Ifton Meadows continued:

Just a reminder - All dogs should be under control at all times on this site which means that ALL dogs should be within sight of their owners so that you can pick up their faeces - PLEASE do not use the excuse that you did not see them do it. This means that you should not be allowing your dog on site unless you are with them. You potty train your children before they go to school, you train your cat to use a litter tray so why do you not clean up after your dogs when exercising them. For an example of good practice - Did you know that disability dogs are trained to empty themselves twice before they leave home in a designated area in their garden etc., proving that there is no need for any fouling.

One comment I had from someone who uses the site regularly was that we made things worse when we increased the Parking area because they had seen people just letting their dogs on site then going and sitting back in their car, basically using our beautiful site as a toilet which is not acceptable.

SIX THINGS TO DO WHEN THERE IS A CARDIAC ARREST

In this order:

1. Check that the patient is not breathing

Don't panic

For 10 seconds look at them and see if they take a breath, put a hand on their chest and feel for a rise, listen for sounds of breathing

2. Shout for help - LOUDLY!

... if the patient is not breathing at all or not properly

3. Call 999 straight away ...

Ask for Ambulance

Listen to what the Controller is saying and do it

Once you have given the Controller your location the ambulance is on its way on blue lights

4. Start chest compressions

As soon as you can. The Controller will guide you
Put your phone on loudspeaker so you have two hands free
Don't stop

5. Send for the defibrillator ...

... if somebody is with you to help

They must take with them the key code for the defibrillator cabinet so write it down when the Ambulance Controller reads it out

6. Use the defibrillator

When it arrives, take it out of the case and press the power button to switch it on.

It will give you all the instructions you need and you still have the Controller on your phone – they won't hang up until the crew arrives, so you are not alone


If you haven't got a defibrillator, do what the Controller tells you until the crew arrives
