

If anyone has difficulties with mobility, so long as they do not live too far we would be able to collect. We would also remind everyone that St Martins is now a Dementia Friendly Church.



Weston Rhyn Gardening Club

The Plantain Lily, commonly known as Hosta, was the topic of discussion in the October meeting held at the Institute. Robert Barlow a self taught enthusiastic horticulturalist gave an in depth presentation with a slide show of how The British Hosta and Hemerocallis Society came about and how he and his wife Margaret from

Endon North Staffordshire established their National Collection in a suburban home. They have over 500 varieties, there are over 10,000 varieties of Hostas they originate from North West Asia. A delicacy in many Japanese restaurants. They collect the leaves before they open and then blanch them before putting them into springtime salad. Apparently they taste like a version of salty asparagus. On the other hand Hostas are toxic to dogs! The plant contains a substance known as saponin which causes diarrhoea and vomiting to some animals.

Slugs and snails like the leaves but they dislike gravel so scatter gravel, egg shells or tea bags/coffee granules around the base of the plant before the leaves evolve. If growing Hosta in a pot, smear the lip with vaseline or place copper bands around the plant mound. Use garlic watering, most pests dislike garlic.

There are Hostas of all shapes and sizes but they like certain conditions to thrive. Sandy, rich organic soil, preferably in a shady spot, slightly acidic soil ph6. They will grow in clay but not heavy clay need aeration for the roots to spread. They grow well in moist soil not immersed in water. They need very little water even in a drought. Never water the leaves only at the base as the sun will scorch the leaves. Some need plenty of space as the leaves are big e.g. Hosta sieboldiana leaves are 30cms/12 inches long. Hostas can tolerate morning sun but not hot afternoon sun. The variegated type has less chlorophyll so if exposed to sun you may lose the variegation. Plant a variety of Hostas but ensure white and gold varieties are not too close to one another. The rule of thumb is the thinner the leaf the less sun you should give them. Potash will help maintain crisp leaves. Mulch hostas will produce organic matter such as well rotted manure/ compost in autumn.Maintenance is minimal when the flowers finish cut back to divert energy back into the plant and when the leaves die back in Autumn remove. These plants are a joy and very versatile if you have the right conditions to grow.

I hope this introduction to Hostas will wet the appetite and everyone will venture out and get as enthusiastic about them as Mr Robert Barlow and myself.

Darren Rudge gave a presentation on Low Maintenance Gardening on 10th of November more about this in the next issue of the Wren and St Martin's Village Life.

St. Martins FC 2 Isle of Man 10



This was the Isle of Man's first game since their first home game of the season so their return to 'distance travel' didn't upset their performance as they executed an impressive 10 - 2 defeat of St. Martins FC. They took the lead in the 19th minute via a tap-in by Furo Davies latching onto a perfect cross from Chris Bass.

The Saints provided a robust fightback but didn't score and were punished again in the 32nd conceding a penalty that was confidently scored

by Isle of Man captain Jack Mcvey.

The Saints fought back however and were awarded a penalty just before half time which Emanuel Mateus Ferandes confidently fired home.

The Saints confidence acquired via this goal was soon diminished however, as Chris Bass pounced onto a cross that had hit the bar, scoring his side's third goal minutes into the second half. Five minutes later striker Sean Doyle tapped the ball home after a Lee Gale shot was parried by the goalkeeper to establish a 1-4 lead early in the second half.

The Isle of Man dominated the game at this point and almost inevitably they scored their 5th goal as Furo Davies headed home in the 60th minute from one of several corners.

Just four minutes later Davies became the provider as Lee Gale fired home his cross in the 64th minute. Luke Murray flew past several Saints players to fire home an impressive 7th goal for the Isle of Man in the 71st minute. Isle of Man introduced Nathan Cardy into the game who promptly fired the ball home, in the 74th minute.

Although demoralised at this point, in the 76th minute 'Saint Martin's' Robert Weir converted a cross into the box firing home to reduce the score to 2-8, however five minutes later, Furo Davies completed his hat-trick to become 'Man of the Match' for Isle of Man. Nathan Cardy scored his second goal in the 87 minutes, finishing of a precise move to confirm a remarkable 2-10 win for the 'Isle of Man' and to strike another painful blow to St. Martins FC.

Stockport Town 3 St. Martins FC 1

St Martins FC had the daunting task of playing an impressive Stockport Town team following their painful 2 – 10 defeat to the 'Isle of Man'.

The Saints provided a stoic performance, matching the energy of a good Stockport team but sadly losing 3 – 1 helped by a Stockport own goal and a stunning performance from Goalkeeper Fin Gunn. Both teams provided a lively start to the game but it was Stockport who opened the scoring in the 20th minute as Paul Turnbull's swerving cross deceived everyone to curl into the top corner of the Saints goal.

A goal scored 53rd minute by Wealth Dasilva Olajide for Stockport dented the Saint's spirit which was lifted briefly in the 77th minute by a Stockport own Goal.

William Calligan grabbed the all-important next goal for Stockport in the 83rd minute with a fine volley that flew into the net to secure the three points.

Abbey Hey 10 St. Martins 1

St Martins FC's woeful progression of defeats continued via their visit to Abbey Hey whose superiority on the day was testified by the 10 goals that they scored. St. Martins were never in the game and the warning signs were evident from the kick-off as several chances for Abbey Hey went begging in the opening minutes so it was no surprise in the seventh minute when Aron Fleming headed into an empty net to score the opening goal of what turned out to be a route for his team.

Abbey Hey Centre Forward, Ben Halfacre, led his team's attack with aplomb; scoring an impressive hattrick in the 17^{th,} 25th and 40th minute establishing a comfortable 4-0 half time lead assisted by some poor defending by St. Martins and a goalkeeper error by Jack Jones, who, to address this mistake made several excellent saves avoiding what could have been an onslaught before half time.

The Saint's moral was shattered when Abbey Hey 's dominance was re-established early in the second half when Jordan Lazenbury took advantage of flat defence to race through and score his sides 5th goal in the 49th minute.

The goals kept coming for Abbey as Dylan Norris scored in the 58th minute and Dylan Fitzgerald in the 62nd before Jordan Lazenbury established the highest score of the day, breaking the Saints defence by scoring another three times in the 63rd, 72nd and 81st minutes, finishing with an all-round personal tally of 4 goals to complete an overall 10 goals scored by his club.

Clearly, this game was another nightmare for St. Martins and must have been for new player, centre forward Emanual Ferandes, a fact slightly pacified by him scoring his new club's one and only goal in the 84th minute from the penalty spot after he was fouled in the penalty box.

Maine Road 7 St. Martins 0

St. Martins FC were hoping to redress some of the anxiety prevailing at the club following a progression of heavy defeats but sadly this was not the day that the turn in fortune occurred. That turn-around looked very feasible for the opening quarter of the game as both teams created chance after chance in a fast-flowing entertaining opening quarter with both goalkeepers making stunning saves. Significantly for St. Martins the 'break through' fell to Maine Road in the 24th minute with a fabulous once-in a-lifetime 30 yard shot from subsequent man-of-the-match Lewis Edwards, his shot sailing into the top right corner of the net.

The Saint's, shocked by this stunning goal, dropped their concentration guard as Maine Road swept through their defence via a swift interchange of passes that concluded with a simple tap-in goal in the 31st minute from a grateful Yousif Bellater, taking a two-goal lead pleasing the disbelieving home supporters. To add insult to injury for the Saints 'Maine Road' were gifted a penalty awarded when a Jamie Roe's wayward shot into the box hit the arm of James O'Reilly as he fell in the box. Lewis Edwards stepped up to confidently score the penalty, securing his teams 3-0 lead in the 35th minute.

These 3 goals had destroyed the Saints morale, a fact that was painfully realised by Maine Road in the opening 10 minutes of the second half as they penetrated the Saints defence with ease as Yousif Yousif scored in the 55th and 58th, Ben Mooney in the 57th and Louis Edwards completing his hattrick and his club's 7th goal in the 60th minute.

St. Martins FC 0 Rocester FC 4

Following two recent defeats the new management team for St. Martins FC were hoping to achieve their first win in the home game vs Rocester FC, who were sitting one step above them at second to bottom in the North West Counties League Division 1 South. Sadly, this wasn't achieved even though there were moments in the game that provided hope for a better future for both teams.

A hectic start to the game saw both teams' attacking prowess but it was Rocester who scored first in the 15th minute as Cavan Halford finished off a swift exchange of passes, breaking down their left wing and crossing the ball into the 6-yard box for the simplest of tap-ins.

Immediately following the first goal, St's forward Sam Roberts fired a blistering shot from outside the box that looked a certain goal but Charlie Wood, Rocester's keeper made a stunning save tipping the ball over the bar. To add to the St's pain, in the 20th minute Alexander Cimino scored what subsequently proved to be the goal-of-the-game, firing home a free kick from yards outside the penalty box.

Following this district moral-testing incident, St Martins, determined not to drop their heads, fought hard to retrieve this game, a fact typified by the efforts of brothers, James and Michael O'Reilly who combined to cross the ball into their centre forward 'Tom Ash' but his header sailed just wide of the Rocester post. New signing Callum Graybrook returning to the club he played for in their period in the West Midland League fought tirelessly to ignite his sides recovery and whose long distant shot was miraculously tipped over the bar again by Charlie Wood.

The Saints were fighting back to reduce the deficit and several shots tested Rocester keeper Charlie Wood, but their efforts were thwarted by a swift counter attack that left Cavan Holford with the simplest of tap-ins to increase his team's lead to 3 - 0 in the 60^{th} minute.

St's maintained their efforts but this wasn't to be their day as they witnessed Gareth Radcliffe's free kick dip inches over the bar and ,minutes later, a defence splitting pass from Jordon Harper fell to Tom Ash whose chip over the keeper once again fell just wide.

In contrast, Rocester substitute David Ndene broke the St's square back-line to run onto the edge of the box and fire hard and low past a despairing Jack Jones to score his club's 4th goal in the 88th minute, securing three vital away points in this clash of teams struggling at the bottom of the league. ¹¹

5 Top tips for tending your garden in winter

1. Sow your onions

Boxing Day is traditionally a day for sowing onions, but you can do this anytime in January too. Sow the seeds into a tray of compost, then water, and keep them warm. Later in the spring, move them into your onion bed.

2. Planting garlic and preparing groundwork

You can still plant garlic in January or February. Choose varieties that are bred for the UK climate, such as 'Chesnok Wight' and 'Solent Wight'. First, you need to prepare the ground a little. Try to avoid the garden when it's cold, because you can get tired easily, so choose a warmish day. Then, if you can, plant the garlic in raised beds or large pots. Preparing the bed is easy enough, simply take a hoe and chop away at the soil until it looks like crumbly cake mix.



3. Try to stay off the lawn if you can

Keep off the grass in January, especially if it snows, but if your lawn needs a tidy up, give it an edging. It might take you a fortnight to finish the job, but the results are as good as mowing.


4. Sowing lettuce and cabbage

You can sow lettuce in trays for leaf picking. I love 'Winter Density'. Also you can sow the cabbage variety 'All Year Round' in trays and modules for transplanting later in the year.



5. Planting bare-rooted trees

January is the time for planting bare-rooted trees. Normally you would dig a big hole, take the newspaper off the roots of your tree and hold it while you back-fill with good-quality soil. Instead, I just take a spade, push it into the ground, wiggle it about to make a gap and plant in this. Then simply pile a load of compost around the tree and the job's done, avoiding having to dig a big hole.
