Hello and Welcome to our April magazine. We hope you will find some interesting and informative reads.



Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

The latest parish council meeting was held in St Martins Centre on the 10th March 2022.

Planning issues seemed to dominate the agenda. Firstly on the development of eight Camping Pods to the South of Firs Close in St Martins. Despite objections from the parish council and many residents, Shropshire Council allowed this application to be approved by a delegated planning officer rather than putting this to the planning committee. Then in February this year a further application was submitted by the developer for the erection of a service building and amendments to the site layout of previously approved plan Ref 21/03260/FUL. One of the conditions on the first application required approval before the development commences; including a scheme of surface and foul water drainage has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. Work on the amendments to the site layout of roads had taken place before approval on the surface and foul water drainage had been granted. This shows a lack of agreed council planning process. These concerns have now been sent to Shropshire Council's Head of Planning, Head of Legal and their Council Leader and registered under Shropshire Council's Formal Complaints Procedure.

Secondly a further concern has now been raised over the development at the old Ifton School. For many years now the parish council have been concerned over the capacity of the main sewerage system through the village following all the new development over the last few years. We understand that the developers will be undertaking a CCTV survey of the drainage system along Overton Road. We await the results.

With regard to the adoption of the roads on the Irvine Gardens estate, Shropshire Councils Developing Highways Manager has confirmed that the roads have only recently been final surfaced, with a 12 months maintenance period now in place before adoption can be completed.

There is still confusion over the future of the Doctors Surgery in St Martins. Despite a survey being carried out last year no results have been forthcoming on its future. The latest update we have received from the Chirk Surgery was that they had been advised that the next decision meeting is due to take place mid-March but no further information was available. A discussion then took place on the ownership of the branch surgery building and adjoining land in St Martins. It was stated that Chirk Surgery are claiming that this building and land is in their ownership and owned by the Chirk Surgery GP partners. We requested document evidence on this which has not been forthcoming, therefore clarification will now be sought through the Land registry.

Concerns have been expressed over the dangerous state of the fencing adjacent to the car park on Overton Road next to the three Take-away shops just before the school. It has been reported to the landowner on at least three occasions who is also responsible for the state of the wooden fencing surrounding the Electricity Sub Station next to these shops without any action being taken. This matter will now be put in the hands of Shropshire Council's Highways department.

Our thanks go to Councillor Sophie Hughes-Saunier and the many volunteers who carried out a tree planting scheme in the village and surrounding highway verges over the weekend of the 12th/13th March.

Climate Action

Over 100 trees were planted by Climate Action St Martins Parish Council's group of volunteers on Sunday 13th March. St Martins Parish Church and Stan's will also be planting a tree this year to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, as part of the Queen's Green Canopy. There's still time to plant a tree & add it to the map queensgreencanopy.org

The climate crisis, brexit & war in Ukraine highlight the need to become more self sufficient, and less reliant on imports:

- Plant fruit pips in toilet roll tubes and put vegetable ends in water to stimulate root regeneration = free food from waste. Also find free items via the Olio app.
- Create a compost heap, easily made out of old pallets (find on freegle, free cycle or freeloved), using your food & garden waste to provide free, nutrient-rich mulch for your garden.
- Install water butts to collect rainwater from your roof to water your plants for free.
- Repair belongings (contact Oswestry Repair Cafe). Borrow and find second-hand before buying new. Buy, sell & swap items via Vinted, eBay, Depop & Preloved.
- Ensure your home is well insulated, use a smart energy meter & turn your heating down to 18 degrees. Wear layers of natural fibre clothing to regulate your body temperature. Switch to a 100% renewable energy tariff. Air dry instead of using tumble dryer.
- Obtain quotes for solar panels, a heat pump & electric vehicle to eliminate your reliance on expensive, polluting fossil fuels. Look for green home improvement mortgage deals & grants.
- Buy British = Less air miles, supports our local economy & most likely better quality (long lasting) too. Switch to fossil fuel free investment bank such as Triodos.

March: Apples, Beetroot, Bussels Sprouts, Cabbages, Carrots, Cauliflowers, Celeriac, Chard, Courgettes, Garlic, Kale, Leek, Lettuce, Mushrooms, Onions, Parsnips, Pears,

Potatoes, Purple Sprouting Broccoli, Radishes, Red Cabbage, Rhubarb, Salad Leaves, Spinach, Spring Greens, Spring Onions, Swede.

April: Apples, Asparagus, Cabbages, Carrots, Cauliflowers, Celeriac, Chard, Courgettes, Garlic, Kale, Leek, Lettuce, Mushrooms, New Potatoes, Onions, Parsnips, Pears, Potatoes, Purple Sprouting Broccoli, Radishes, Rhubard, Salad Leaves, Spinach, Spring Greens, Spring Onions, Watercress.

May: Apricots, Asparagus, Aubergines, Broad Beans, Cabbages, Carrots, Cauliflowers, Chard, Cherries, Courgettes, Garlic, Gooseberries, Kale, Lettuce, Mushrooms, New Potatoes, Onion, Peas, Peppers, Potatoes, Purple Sprouting Broccoli, Radishes, Rhubard, Rocket, Salad Leaves, Spinach, Spring Greens, Spring Onions, Strawberries, Watercress.



FRIENDS OF IFTON MEADOWS

Due to the storms in February we have been unable to work on site. Each week we made arrangements to work and then I had to ring around to cancel. Who could have envisaged the type of weather we have had after a relatively dry January.

I am writing this on the 1st of March and by the time you read it we hopefully have managed to coppice the willow from the wildlife corridor at the far end of the reserve by Pen y Banc. You may have seen farmers rushing to cut back their hedges recently this is because It is illegal to cut back hedges (due to birds breeding) between the 1st March and 31st August unless it is for coppicing or a danger, because we are coppicing we can still work on this area but have to be careful in other areas. Coppicing is when you cut back trees/shrubs which then shoot from the bottom - this was used years ago to make charcoal or for weaving into baskets or fencing. We do it in this area because the willow is taking over and we need to add different types of trees to make this hedgerow more diverse.

In the same vein I would like to remind people that March is the start of the breeding season

for our SKYLARKS so could you please keep off the Mound from now until September while they are breeding. Skylarks are ground nesting birds who are on the ENDANGERED RED LIST - for them to breed successfully they do **NOT** need **PEOPLE OR DOGS** disturbing their nests - you have all helped to increase the numbers we have over the years by doing this and I thank you for that and to remind you that under the wildlife and countryside act it is a criminal offence to Intentionally or recklessly disturb such listed birds.

The Snowdrops gave us a lovely display during January and February and into March



and by the time you read it the Celandines and Dogs Mercury will have been providing us with more colour and beauty throughout March, this will be followed by the Wild Garlic in the Dingle with its pungent smell and swathes of flowers , also look out for the Bluebells as they will now be coming into bud and flower at the end of April and into May and June or maybe they will arrive earlier as the daffodils in my garden have this year.

I would like to remind everyone that we are always looking for more helpers - everyone is welcome the only restriction is that anyone under 16 years must be accompanied by an adult - this is for two reasons 1- we use sharp tools and 2 - we are nor vetted to work with children. We normally work on the second Sunday of each month, meeting at 1.30p.m. at the Colliery (main) entrance.



We await a reply.

Dear Mr Polin

Two years ago St. Martin's surgery closed. This is a branch of Chirk surgery which is just inside Shropshire. There are over 4000 patients on the "English" side of the boarder. Chirk is not accessible without a vehicle, the bus service does not serve the majority of the village.

Covid was cited as a "temporary" closure two years ago. We as a community have organised petitions, e petitions sent letters had newspaper articles, discussed it in the Parish Council every month. I joined the Parish council to try to help. I am a retired nurse and thought at least we could have comprehensive responses for our plea for a yes or no answer to the reopening, or permanent closure. I write regularly to the Practice Manager at Chirk.

Your meeting cancelled in January and is now scheduled for mid-March. We cannot move on with providing local Health care until we have a definitive answer from you.

St. Martins is the largest village in Shropshire and growing much larger.

Please update me as soon as possible with The Health Boards intention.

When are Royal Mail stamps changing?

And what to do with your old 1st and 2nd class stamps





Both first and second class stamps will feature a barcode, which recipients scan to see an animated film (Image: PA)

The way stamps are issued is changing, with Royal Mail introducing a new barcoded stamp.

Royal Mail explained: "Following a successful national trial we will now be adding unique bar codes to all our regular 'everyday' Definitive and Christmas stamps."

Special issue stamps will not have barcodes on.

Each barcoded stamp will have a digital twin and the two will be connected via the Royal Mail App.

The move is intended to improve operational efficiencies and security features.

The barcodes will match the stamp colour and must remain intact for the stamp to be considered valid.

You will be able to 'swap out' your old stamps for new ones from March 31, 2022.

You can do this through a Swap Out form - by contacting Royal Mail Customer

Experience and having a form delivered to you, or pick one up from your Royal Mail Delivery Office's Customer Service point. The new stamps are available to buy now on the Royal Mail online shop.

The barcodes will provide customers with access to exclusive video content, including one that features the lovable Shaun the Sheep.

The non-barcoded stamps will be usable until January 31, 2023 so be sure to use them up.

Weston Rhyn Gardening Club

Almost there! That is, covid restrictions are lifted and we can get back to some normality.



Learning to live with covid will be the norm and Weston Rhyn Gardening Club are living proof of this. Good turn out for Jill Cawthray talk on Not all Nettle . An intriguing title I thought, what can that be all about. Jill, an environmental science graduate who lives locally did not disappoint. Familiar to some people in the audience as she is frequently seen at Plant Fairs locally which will be held at Whittington Castle on the 15th of April. Free entry but pay to park, event runs from 10am until 4pm.

Jill's talk highlighted on promoting wildlife but not wilderness in our gardens. The main message was not to be too tidy in our gardens. There are various ways of increasing wildlife to our gardens and here are some pointers.

- 1. A perfect manicured lawn was an inspiration for all diligent gardeners but it is no longer the case. Many follow the National Trust campaign of No Mow May. Why do you ask? If one leaves the grass to grow we encourage small mammals to thrive and pollinators to grow such as the wild daisy and white clover. If a manicured lawn is your thing, maybe leave sections of grass to grow or even create a wild meadow incorporating nettles, snake head fritillary, buttercups, teasel and other natural species.
- 2. A water feature in a garden brings a variety of wildlife into your space, The water feature can be as small as a buried bucket or trough no need to have a sizable pond.
- 3. Build a bug hotel or even leave leaves, twigs, rotten wood into a pile that provides shelter and food for various invertebrates to enjoy.
- 4. Hedgerows are beneficial so if replacing a fence consider planting a hedge, If fences are your thing plant evergreen climbers such as clematis, ivy etc. allow gaps in the fence for passing mammals.
- 5. Composting garden waste uncooked house waste will enrich your garden and once again provide habitat for worms, woodlice and the like.
- 6. Feeding birds in winter adds another dimension to your garden. This can be enhanced by placing bird boxes around the garden at a height cats cannot reach.
- 7. Consider planting flowers and shrubs throughout the year so as to encourage the bees and moths into your garden.

The key is not to be too tidy, and in autumn allow the garden to sleep naturally. We have lost 50% of our hedgerows and 97% of our wild meadows without mentioning woodlands so as gardeners we can help rekindle British wildlife.

The inclement weather is depressing but we can store rainwater in water butts for later in the year and wherever possible recycle useful plastic waste such as plastic milk/pop bottles as flower pots for example On creating an interesting 12 month garden. On April 13th Anne Harrison gives a demonstration and talk on propagation and plants for free which will come in very handy for our plant sale on May14th at the Institute.

We look forward to welcoming all members and visitors to our meetings 7.15 for 7.30pm start at the Institute. Once again we will have a table for members to bring in seeds and plant cuttings to swap. Bethan Owen

St Martins Recreation Project:

Following on from last issue's article about the future sport facilities proposed for the

St Martins community, on land adjacent and beyond St Martins School, here is a further

update:

• The Partnership Committee has been re-formed with representatives from St Martins

School, St Martins Parish Council and St Martin Football Club to rekindle the good planning

work completed before the world stopped for Covid.

Works required to widen the access way off the main road were completed over the half

term holiday by Evans Contractors. By doing these works this Spring we have ensured that our

outline planning permission for a recreation site is secured and avoids it becoming lapsed, in

the Summer, due to Covid delays.

Our next main action is to start engaging with the Football Foundation for the installation of

a new floodlit 3G surface football pitch; there will be several months of feasibility studies and

business case work plus a further detailed planning application to ensure that a pitch would be

physically possible and financially viable. This pitch, if built, will be funded by the Football

Foundation for the local clubs to use, hopefully from early 2024.

After the 3G football pitch is built, it is hoped that other facilities such as a MUGA (Multi

User Games Area), a Clubhouse and a Cricket Pitch will be built but all depend on raising

enough funds for their creation and continued maintenance.

In addition to these more formal sports areas, it is planned to create a playing field area for

the community to use for casual kick around and other recreation. These can be created more

quickly than the formal areas; hopefully during 2024 as the football pitch work concludes.

As soon as the activity with the Football Foundation is underway, the Partnership Committee

will be asking for members of the community to get involved in taking forward the other

options listed above.

Information is limited at the moment, as the preliminaries are being worked through, but if you
