We have some freshly trained people in our village who know what to do when they are confronted with a medical emergency. Knowing how to use an available defibrillator is such a valuable thing. Youth Club had training sessions and there were also three further classes held in the Village Hall. They were led by Effie Cadwallader, an excellent trainer, and we are very grateful to her for giving up her time to teach us a valuable skill. Thank you Effie.

We have to remember the warm sunny days of summer, followed by a lovely mild autumn, now we are confronted by rain, grey days and cold weather. There are warm rooms available for you to go and get a tea or coffee and join in with chatting to others from the village. There are posters in the village advertising the places to go, such as: Tuesday Coffee and Chat at The Village Hall, from 10:00am, Coffee Morning at The Chapter House, as well as Sunday Social Club, held the first Sunday of each month at 3:00pm. Also, at The Chapter House from the 8th January every Sunday until March is Afternoon Tea from 3:30—5:30pm. Transport will be available; just contact the Vicar on 01691 778468.

Thursday morning you can go along to Ellesmere Road Methodist Church for their Coffee Mornings. There is also Age UK at Cedar Close 10:00am till 2:30pm on a Tuesday.

Shropshire County Council does have the responsibility for our main road lights, and it is good to see we are at last getting some lights back on Ellesmere Road. But there are lights out on other stretches of road. We do report them. Our side roads are Parish Council responsibility and we do get a good response from Highline, our contractors, whenever we report a problem. Always let a Parish Councillor know if there is a lighting fault, as we aim to get it rectified as soon as possible.

Our Parish Council meetings are held in the Village Hall, second Thursday of the month at 7:00pm. Members of the public are welcome to come along and listen to our decisions, or you can come and let us know of any problems. We are all volunteers, and are here to support the village.

Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

The last meeting of St Martins Parish Council was held in St Martins Village Hall on Thursday 10th November 2022.

Much of this meeting was taken up by reporting on long-standing issues within the parish, which included:

Street Lighting. After two years of reporting faults on streetlights along Ellesmere Road, Shropshire Council who maintain these lights have eventually started to repair these, although shades for these lights are still outstanding. However, a series of lights from the roundabout by Stans Superstore to the school along Overton Road, which were reported two months ago, are still awaiting maintenance by Shropshire Council's contractors, KIER. With the clocks altering at the end of October, Shropshire Councillor Steve Davenport was aware of these concerns and is trying to put pressure on the Head of Street Lighting at Shropshire Council for urgent attention. This will now be brought to the attention of our MP Helen Morgan. Any faults to street lighting that are owned by the Parish Council and maintained by Highline Electrical are usually repaired within two weeks of being reported.

Highway Issues. Again, it is now over two years since the Parish Council met with officers from Shropshire Council to come up with suggestions and designs to improve the road structure around the junction of the three roads that meet at the mini roundabout by Stans Superstore. Although one design was forwarded to the Parish Council at the beginning of this year, various changes were suggested, and nine months later we are still waiting for an alternative design to take into account the views of the Parish Council.

Another long-standing highway issue is finding a way to improve the safety of vehicles crossing over Escob Bridge. Although Shropshire Councillor, Steve Davenport, has again met highway officers from Shropshire Council on site, with a suggestion of traffic lights either side of this bridge, nothing has been done about this. He is now hoping to meet Shropshire Council's Portfolio Holder for Highways, Councillor Richard Marshall, on site to demonstrate the safety issues at this bridge.

School Safety. Shropshire Council were asked some months ago to carry out an urgent review on safety issues outside the main school including inadequate street marking, speed limits, signage, and warning flashing lights. Still no response or site meeting arranged with the relevant officers.




Thanksgiving Remembrance service Saturday 3rd Dec 5pm

During a week of co-ordinated national action targeting county lines drug dealing, over 30 people have been arrested across the West Mercia area

'County Lines' is the name given to the process and operation of drugs transported from predominately larger urban areas to smaller towns, often in rural areas, with the 'line' referring to the mobile number used to order the drugs. The competition between rival gangs also sees innocent people caught up in the challenge for control of the drug dealing.

Last week (between 3 October and 9 October) officers from across West Mercia Police supported the National Crime Agency's County Lines Intensification Week, which saw 38 people arrested and a number of warrants carried out at residential properties.

Drugs with an estimated street value of more than £7,000 were seized during the week with a number of weapons such as knives, machetes, batons and vehicles seized, along with 36 mobile phones. More than £15,000 in cash was also recovered by officers during the week of intelligence led intensified activity.

County lines drug dealers often exploit children and young people, recruiting them to run drugs and cash between urban and county locations and to deal drugs on their behalf. Once recruited into county lines it can be difficult for those being exploited to leave, with fear and threats of violence used to keep them in place.

Anyone with suspicions that a property is being used to sell drugs, or that a young and vulnerable individual may be getting involved with county lines drug dealing can report this online under the Tell Us About section of our website www.westmercia.police.uk or information can be given anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555111.

More information for children and young people about county lines can be found by visiting Fearless www.fearless.org/ Fearless is a site where you can access non-judgemental information and advice about crime and criminality. County Lines Intensification Week forms part of West Mercia Police's Protect campaign. Protect sees police work closely with partners to tackle serious and organised crime and the harm it causes. The broad-ranging campaign comprises four key areas of activity:

- Pursue prosecuting and disrupting those involved in SOC
- Prevent stopping individuals from becoming involved in SOC
- Protect increased levels of protection against SOC
- Prepare reducing the impact of SOC where it occurs



FRIENDS OF IFTON MEADOWS

Autumn is now here and trees are looking lovely with colours changing before they drop their leaves and take a rest over the winter months, recharging for the coming Spring when they will again burst into life.

We have been busy over the last few months removing the birch saplings from the Skylark Mound. Without removing these rough saplings there would soon be nowhere for the Skylarks to nest. It is a never-ending job because once a birch reaches maturity it becomes a Mast tree which then sends out hundreds of seeds.

On the bright side we have also been surveying the various things to be found on site, which include the fungi - 28 species were found on the lower pathway last week. Unfortunately after working for two hours and taking both written descriptions and photographs to help with identification, when I put the disc from my camera into my laptop it told me that it was corrupt, so I lost all the pictures which means we must do it again. Not the best result for an afternoon's work but we did have good weather and a pleasant walk.


Looking on our 'Friends of Ifton Meadows' Facebook page I see many of you have also been recording the fungi; thank you for sharing your pictures. If you are interested in helping us with surveying, could you let us know the date and which part of the site you found the items you photographed.

Another site survey showed badger, fox, field mice and squirrels. We will continue surveying



with the help of 'The 3 Parish Big Local'. Surveying equipment is expensive, this grant allowed us to obtain the correct equipment for example quadrats of the right size and shape.

We shall continue to work taking out the birch saplings and if anyone would like to join us, we can be found on site on the second Sunday of each month (weather permitting).

Weston Rhyn Gardening Club

October has been meek and mild. November began appallingly wet.

The gardening season is still in full swing with an abundance of fruit such as apples and pears to harvest and store for the making of chutneys and pickles and such like. Preparing the garden for winter is also on the cards, not too tidy mind- remember the birds and the young shoots in spring.

Margaret Herbert the former head gardener at Lake Vyrnwy Hotel, Llanwddyn, Powys, saved the day on October 12th as the scheduled speaker was unavailable. Margaret has over 20 years' experience in horticulture and gave a presentation on gardening in the 21st Century. The presentation was predominantly focused on the effect of climate change in her own garden which is prone to flooding during the wet season. Many things have changed, but fundamentally the change in weather patterns and temperature is significant.


Since the 1800s, human activity has been the main driver in climate change. The 19th Century brought industrialization, the 20th Century brought Spanish flu, World Wars, nuclear power, space exploration and changing trends in agriculture. The 21st century has brought a pandemic. More natural disasters are evident such as droughts, increased temperatures, flooding, tsunamis and hurricanes and possibly positive advances in technology. Our creator created heaven (the ozone layer) and earth and we are hell bent on making holes in the roof, we are slow to learn. As gardeners we can be one step ahead and grow more of our own vegetables, reduce the carbon footprint by shopping locally and using produce that are in season.

Our speaker on December 14th is John Scrace who will speak about Bugs, Slugs, Spots and Rot. Pesticides and fertilisers will be mentioned for certain and alternative methods hopefully considered which are environmentally friendly.

We look forward to meeting up and listening to John's tips and advice.

Remembrance Sunday Parade

Sunday 13th of November at 11am our community observed a minute silence to remember the fallen in the worlds conflicts, not only those who fell in the 2 World Wars but those in many other conflicts since. Glen Pennington (former soldier) read the names of those from the World Wars, Terry Ellis spoke the words of Exhortation (They shall not grow old....), Mr John Thomas (former Royal Navy) laid the wreath on behalf of the community and Julie Garrett played the Last Post and Reveille. The Rev Stuart Jermy led the whole proceeds.

The Scouts and Guides marching in with their standards flying high and once positioned in an arc around the War Memorial the rest of the community congregated around them.
