Music MOB – saving children's music

A cursory search through local Facebook pages uncovers a huge variety of live music taking place within the area. Throughout the year there are bands, groups and solo artists performing, choirs singing, open mic events, the annual Oswestry Live and now also the Party in the Park. Oswestry's vibrant annual Youth Music Festival, which returned after an absence due to Covid, saw a record 1,000 participants. We are so fortunate and we hope the musical life of the area continues.

It is exactly this continuation which local charity Music MOB hopes to protect and develop. The charity was formed in 2019 to ensure that instrumental and vocal teaching remains accessible to everyone regardless of an ability to pay and the service is offered to children in local primary schools from Year 3.

After only starting lessons in October 2021 with 24 children in Holy Trinity Primary School, by the end of the academic year Music MOB teachers were teaching 66 children in three local primary schools violin, cello, flute, clarinet, saxophone, guitar, voice and drums, with the lessons and instrument hire absolutely free.

As for the future, the charity is delighted that almost all the children who started lessons in October 2021 are keen to continue for another year. This year we moved into brass teaching with trumpet and cornet and also started two choirs and a recorder ensemble. The charity has been contacted by two other schools and will start teaching at Weston Rhyn Primary and Ellesmere Primary in January 2023, taking our total to almost 100 children.

PARKINSON'S^{UK}

"Why is your left hand trembling sometimes, granddad?" asked my eldest grandson. "Why does it take so long to do up your shoelaces?" asked my eldest daughter. 'Why have I lost my sense of smell totally?' I asked myself. What is going on? It's April 2014 and I am 4 months into enforced retirement from Kronospan at the age of 64, after giving the company 34 years of my life and enjoying every minute of it. Suddenly the world has changed and I am no longer striving to achieve production targets, dealing with employees and contractors, managing health and safety, fighting fires and soaking up the stress which totally motivated me.

So is this how it happens? Is this how it is going to be going forward? With everything slowing down as the years go by until the day that the good Lord pulls my number out in the lottery of life and they put the lid on my box?




By June of that year I have been persuaded by my wife and two daughters that I should visit my doctor to see if there are some symptoms that can indicate if there are other issues afoot. He advised me that I should see a Neurologist and he would make an appointment which should take about 6 weeks. After some debate I decided that I would pay for the consultation and was given an appointment for the following week in Wrexham. After 10 minutes with the Neurologist he confirmed I had the onset of Parkinson's disease. What the hell is it? Can it kill you? What symptoms have I got? How long have I got in God's lottery? What preparations should I make? So many questions but no one to supply the answers . After some research and communication with Parkinson's UK I began to realise that the disease and its symptoms can be managed with medication and an element of discipline in both exercise and diet.

There are 180,000 people who are currently suffering with the disease that is caused by a reduction in production of dopamine in the brain that caries messages to the muscles in the body. In the past it has been perceived as a senior illness but more and more people are being diagnosed in their 40/50s. There are many symptoms of varying strengths that can occur. These are just a sample, starting with the lesser issues up to the issues that require more management: lost sense of smell, shuffling of feet, difficulty in doing up buttons and shoelaces, cleaning of teeth, when writing, letters and words diminish in size as the sentence is created, speech becomes quieter, and limbs move of their own accord and are prone to tremor. As the disease progresses trips and falls become extremely likely as muscles refuse to control limbs. Any fine detailed work with the hands becomes more difficult, like wiring a plug or drilling a hole in the wall. These are just some of the indicators of the brain not manufacturing sufficient Dopamine. Medication and exercise can slow the progression of the disease but there is currently no cure for the debilitating illness. Medication is, in itself, a lottery, as rarely are two people suffering the same symptoms so there is much trial and error to establish what works for you. Once you start on medication you join 'the tablet carousel' where you have to take tablets to cope with the side effects from taking your Parkinson's medication. These can include nightmares, aching joints, mood swings, compulsive actions such as gambling or shoplifting, palpitations and many more. But if it's any consolation, if you read the information document in any prescribed medication you would never take another tablet in your life.

So this illness progresses while research tries to find a cure and we have to deal with the day to day issues . Socialising becomes difficult because you don't want friends to see how you are and fears that you can ruin a social event because you have a 'downer day'.

If you have recently been diagnosed with Parkinson's and you need support or advice on how to manage the disease, come to one of our meetings in St Martins Village Centre on the second Wednesday of every month, except December, at 11:00am. 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


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

St. Martins FC 1 Dawley Town FC 7

St. Martins FC faced the biggest challenge of their season, taking on Dawley Town, the team that is sitting on top of the Shropshire League Premier Division and who had yet to drop a point. Saints Manager Liam Braisdell decided to play Tom Ash, the Saints Coach, into the centre of mid-field to introduce some experience into what is a very young team. His decision worked as the Saints matched their high-flying opponents thanks to Ash's control in midfield, Rob Weir's dribbling skills, outstanding saves from their keeper Fin Gun, and an overall determined approach from the Saints.

Saints' forwards created their own chances but they couldn't find that final finishing shot and were devastated when Tom Bradley pounced to hammer the ball against the bar which was then judged to have gone over the line to provide Dawley with a goal lead in the 45 + 2 minute added on for stoppages.

This late first half goal had a devastating impact on the Saints who conceded early into the second half as Jordon Jones pounced on a through ball into the six-yard box, hammering home Dawley's second goal in the 47th minute.

Sadly, these two goals destroyed the Saints, who lost control of the game by conceding opposition goals scored by Kieron Buckley in the 50th and 52nd minute, Tom Meesham in the 57th minute, Geoff Watkins in the 74th minute and Kieron Buckley in the 76th minute,

completing a 7-goal onslaught. Saints substitute, Jake Cross, provided an immediate impact by opening the opposition defence with a swift run and shooting home for a consolation goal for the Saints in the 88th minute.

What had started so well for St. Martins FC deteriorated into one of those matches you want to forget, but from which there were some lessons to be learnt for this young side.


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

Goodbye from Big Local

The end of 2022 marks the end of Three Parishes Big Local. In its preliminary stage the vision set out was that "In 10 years time, the Three Parishes Big Local Programme will have improved the lives of the people who live in and around the area. The Three Parishes will be even more safe and comfortable and will be good places to live, learn and grow."

In this time we have seen a lot of changes and growth in our Villages.

Our final Messenger will be coming through your door soon with lots more stories about what we have done, but here are a few highlights and overviews.

Grants

Over £400,000 has been awarded in grants! This funding has helped to maintain, improve and enhance facilities in our villages. It has supported groups and organisations, and created new opportunities.

Health & Wellbeing

A series of helpful health & well being sessions have been delivered across the Three Parishes by Community Resource. There has also been an Eat Well for Less project delivered through the primary schools with helpful tips included in our final messenger.

My Money Matters

Karen Williams has helped residents of 3PBL claim / save over £1million over the course of the project. Her care, commitment and support has been a huge benefit to many and will continue to be so as residents receive the support they are entitled to, but had previously been unaware of, or unable to apply for.

Business support

Paul Newman of Beabetterfish has supported lots of small businesses across the Three Parishes over the last few years. Helping to develop business plans, identify training needs, networking and much more. His support has seen new small businesses in the area grow, recover after Covid, and create some joint initiatives. Also now working on a bespoke enterprise programme in St Martins secondary school, Paul is helping to equip the next generation of entrepreneurs!

Community Events

Pre-Covid the 3PBL partnership put on a number of events for the local community. More recently, grant funding has enabled other groups and organisations to put on village events.

Transport

Through the initial car-share and 'wheels2work' schemes, to the grant and loan from 3PBL which enabled the purchase of the Gobowen Station building, 3PBL partnership has sought to increase opportunities to local residents by tackling some of the transport issues. Transport links provide education and employment opportunities, essential in rural areas.

Legacy Projects

The Legacy Art projects have started across the Three Parishes Big Local area, working with school pupils to create something that will be visible to enjoy now and into the future. Money has also been given to all the Parish Councils to install more benches around the villages, and something of their choice to brighten each village. The schools have also received a final donation.

There are also many grants that have been spent and will leave a lasting impact – improved community buildings and play facilities. Although the project is over, the benefits will continue for years to come.

Thank you for all your support over this time, and we hope you continue to enjoy the benefits that being a Big Local area has had on the Villages of Weston Rhyn. Gobowen & St Martins.
