All applications need to be in by the end of October (31st) and our Finance Committee will initially consider them in November.

So come on you Guides, Scouts, Football teams, Craft Groups, Historians etc. what have you got planned for the next 12 months, do you need some kind of financial backing? Are you thinking of starting a 'not-for-profit' group and need a bit of start up money. Something new has appeared in the play park by Stan's! It's what is known as a MUGA (Multi Use Games Area) End. Goal Post and Basket Ball ring with a porous base. The children had painted goal posts on the fence but as the fence has sharp spikes the footballs were forever being burst. The Parish Council were able to secure some money from some investment by housing developers for recreation purposes and thought this was the best place to build something for the youngsters and it has

been very well used since completion.

Report from St Martins Parish Council Clerk

The September meeting was held in The Moors Community Centre following the short break when no meetings are held in August. The Council welcomed a new Member to the Parish Council, Mrs Lesley-Anne Roberts, which now brings the Parish Council back to full membership.

The Chairman expressed concern at the start of the meeting that Nick Scott from J. Ross Developments Ltd, who had been invited to attend to update Members on the development at Irvine Gardens, did not attend. One area of concern was that the proposed wet area for surface water attenuation. Members remember the original proposal many years ago, but have seen nothing lately. On the removal of the hedge they cannot agree. They have had a look at it and cannot see where the large gaps are (except for the gateway). The hedge has been there a lot longer than many have been in the village and is very dense in places, good for birds and other wild life and it would take many years for a new hedge to provide the same sort of habitat. They also think it would be a good idea to consult with the people living opposite the site to get their views before a decision is made. A further meeting would be requested.

Police issues again raised a lot of debate. The main concern again being the speed of traffic through the village and also overtaking at speed on Moors Bank before the bridge. Members would suggest to the police that a 40 mph buffer zone is introduced on all approach roads to the village before the 30 mph restriction, with a 20 mph zone outside the school in force at either end of the school day. It was also discussed whether speed enforcement guns could be used by volunteers to feedback data to the police. This would require training but some Members questioned whether members of the public would put their names forward. The first approach would be to contact the Community Speed Watch (CSW) to take speed data on the roads of concern. If speeds are particularly high it maybe that CSW is

not the best form of intervention and enforcement by Safer Roads Partnership or some form of engineering by Shropshire Council may be more suitable.

During the Summer repairs have been carried out to the ramps on the Skate Park and two new litter bins installed (the latter thanks to a donation from the St Martins Youth Club). Also a new Multi User Games Area (MUGA) has been installed next to the skate park.

Twenty of the street lighting columns along the main road have had hanging baskets fitted and feedback from residents has been encouraging. A donation from the previous St Martins Summer Fayre Committee partly funded this project which the Parish Council very much appreciated.

A bus shelter has been agreed for Oak Drive and is now awaiting final siting agreement from Shropshire Council.

crop ever of Egremont Russet eating apples.


We had an allotment barbeque on 16th August. We had a great few hours apart from the biting wind that made us all feel quite

August was a record month for CFR jobs: John was sent to 34 and I attended 40. No particular reason, not even seasonal difficulties, just the way it was. I had a bit of a laugh one day when the car door bounced back as I was getting out at a job,

catching me on the chin. I was mopping up my patient's blood at the same time as

he was mopping up mine! I also had a smile when I heard someone referring to the little red CFR car as

"The Stanbulance."

I have given 2 talks to interested groups about what CFRs do. It's a surprise to hear that still not everyone knows CFRs exist, though we keep spreading the word. At one I was thanked



by a lady who was pink, smart and happy, whom I didn't recognise because the last time I saw her she was grey, miserable and covered in — use your imagination! Forgive us when we don't recognise you some time afterwards, but do say Hello because it's always nice to know you are feeling better.

Then there was the First Aid course we did in two 2 hour sessions at the Village Centre under the umbrella of the 3 Parishes Big Local. Although fewer than a dozen people came, they all joined in animatedly and shared their stories to illustrate what we were teaching. Two more of these courses are planned for the autumn, in Weston Rhyn and Gobowen, which anyone can attend. Assistant Head Primary Phase did a grand job in presenting the prizes to all section winners and Best in Show Winner, Well done Duncan.





The Allotment Society sent out a challenge to everyone who lives in St Martins earlier this year. Who could grow the tallest sunflower?


All that village residents had to do was collect their seeds at St Martins Centre.

Jasmine Ford (Under 11 category - 1m 75, 5'10").


The overall tallest sunflower was grown by **Sophie Lee-Trowell** and was a staggering 2m 17cm (7'1") tall.



chronic liver disease


chronic neurological disease, such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease or learning disability
