
Year 11 Adventurers Bag DofE Bronze Award









All in all a very pleasant evening at the cost of £56.05


St Martins Allotment Association

The raised beds, which are for the use of disabled gardeners, have fallen into disrepair and are in desperate need of refurbishment. A letter was sent to all allotment holders to form a working party for an all-day Saturday effort to make good the woodwork. This would entail replacing rotten wood and painting the four beds on the inside and outside with wood preservative paint. I had started investigating the amount of deterioration during the week leading up to the Saturday and had decided that only three of the original posts needed replacing, however, further posts were needed to support the sides of the beds.

On the day the working party consisted of James, Tony, Val, Marian, Dylan and Alex. The project being coordinated by myself, though, in truth I was able to work on drilling and bolting the posts while others saw what was needed and carried on removing soil so that the sides could dry out ready for the posts to be driven in close to the wooden sides in four equal places, drilled and bolted through, then painted before the soil could be replaced. This needed to be done on all four beds. No small task. At this point I would like to mention that ETC the local timber merchant has kindly donated the twenty posts that were needed. We would like to thank them very much for their generous donation. At lunch time our heroes were treated to sandwiches, tea or coffee, made by Val, and as Helen couldn't attend, because of work commitment, had sent a very nice cake. After this refreshing break we continued our work with renewed energy until well into the afternoon when Helen and Keith arrived to help. We were all

amazed by the end of the day just how much work had been done, so much so that it only took a few hours work by four of us on Sunday morning to complete replacing the soil and raking it over.

I would like to thank all who worked tirelessly to complete this refurbishment in a really friendly and happy atmosphere. Martyn Barker

Chairman's report - November 2014 - 2015

A much quieter year with no Lantern Parade. The amount of time we spent each year on preparation was a lot more than I had ever thought.

We planted wild Tenby and British daffodils at the top of the Dingle in November, 2014 and had a good display in Spring 2015.

Green Gyms this year included monitoring of various species and our thanks to Camilla for sorting and collating them. On the plus side there was very little ragwort to pull this year.

An outing in January to the Hafod nature reserve gave us a few ideas for information panels etc., for our own site.

On 10th March 2015 we held a talk on bees of various types at the Centre given by Tony Gray followed by an evening talk on Fungi on 17th September and a guided walk on 27th at the Meadows by John Hughes, Shropshire Wildlife Trust. Both were very well attended. John sent an email stating that he thought that Ifton Meadows was one of the best sites for Fungi in Shropshire.

Shaun carried out repairs to the fence at the Colliery entrance - we had hoped for a new oak fence but unfortunately the fencing suggested by him did not happen due to cuts in his finances, so repairs were required to make the fence safe. Regarding maintenance by the council we have received complaints from the public including some on our 'facebook' site regarding the skylark mound and surrounding area - they felt and we agreed that this year's cut was excessive and not what we expected. Hopefully next year we will have only a third of the skylark mound cut as recommended by RSPB and that it will not be cut so low.

16th May saw us at the 'Big Local' event in Rhyn Park School followed by a visit to our July meeting by their representative Andy Rimmer. In May Bryan and I both went to Shropshire Wildlife Trust in Shrewsbury to discuss whether or not IMMC/Friends of Ifton Meadows could join as an affiliated member. We then applied to join and have been told that we have been accepted. We are awaiting the official letter confirming this.

Bryan and I joined Sue Schofield, St.Martins Parish Council at Ifton Meadows on 17th August for an 'on site visit' with representatives from the Footpath section of Shropshire Council regarding moving the footpath which goes through the garden which Mrs Lewis has purchased from the council. This was the first we knew that the sale had gone through. We have still not received full notification of the boundaries, access etc.,

Our thanks again to Pentre Nurseries who again supported us by donating £60 from the sale of second hand books and for everyone who has supported us throughout this year in one way or another.

Finally I would like to thank Camilla, Elizabeth, Neil, Roy and Bryan for all the work they do at Green Gyms, Meetings etc.. The Volunteer hours worked by the above and myself between October 2014 to September 2015 came to 369 recorded hours but many more are not recorded.

BANK TOP (follow up)

This is an attempt to fill in a number of pieces of information missing from the article in the September edition of Village Life.

Bank Top was constructed to house P.O.W's in 1943 and was CAMP No. 100. Once the war was over, and the Germans had returned home, the camp was used to house "Displaced Persons" until they could be relocated exactly how long this lasted is not known but the camp lay empty for possibly 5 years during which time it became thoroughly derelict!!

The land on which the camp was built was owned by the late Lord Trevor and after it was no longer required by the MOD the complete site was returned to his estate. Subsequently the late Lord Trevor put it up for sale and it was bought in 1958 and run as a Poultry Enterprise until 1979 when that was no longer viable.

What Happened Next?

Eventually Planning Permission was obtained to convert the units for light industrial use – This was a colossal task!!! New infrastructure had to be installed such as 2 new

electrical substations, a new water, telephone and 3 phase electrical supplies taken into the units etc!

However it opened as an Industrial Estate in 1983 with all the units tenanted within 6 months.

The work of repairs and refurbishment continued until 2005 when it was sold to the Brynkinalt Estate as a well presented, clean, tidy and up and running Light Industrial Estate.


My Jamboree Journey:

This is an account of the amazing journey that I am proud and privileged to have been a part of. It concerns my trip to the World Scout Jamboree in Japan which was held in July

of this year. I can honestly say that it has changed my life.

Selection

As the Jamboree only takes place once every four years and since it has limited places due to the sheer number of countries and people taking part a selection must be held to pick the lucky few to make the trip.



My selection was held in November of 2013 in

Shrewsbury lasting a weekend. It was action packed and fast with a huge collection of games to test our personalities, teamwork, confidence and many other factors. I am also very grateful to my scout leader Marvin for a fantastic reference. At the end of the weekend all 60 of us were gathered into a group. 18 of us were asked to leave the room and wait out in the corridor. This is when Steve and Lynne, the leaders journeying with us, surprised us by telling us that we had been picked - we weren't expecting to be told straightaway! As I left the hall I remember my head spinning with shock, appreciation and excitement. I also remember my mum thinking I hadn't been selected because I looked like I was about to cry; happy tears though it turned out.

<u>The build-up</u>

After that emotionally draining weekend followed a long 18 months packed full of suspense, fun and new friendships. And of course lots of fundraising and training weekends but we of course managed to make it all a lot less serious than it probably should have been.

During this time I met the entirety of unit 45 which consisted of the 18 from Shropshire, including me, as well as 9 Scouts from Solihull and 9 Guides from the West-Midlands. During this build up there was lot of bag packing in order to help raise £3,500 per person meaning that we all had to give up a lot of weekends and put in a lot of hard work. Amongst all of these there were however camps which is where I had most of my contact with my fellow participants and where they became my friends. These meet ups were always a lot of fun but the one that sticks with me most was our mystery camp where we ended up catching a train to London and visiting Downing Street!

<u>Japan</u>

Finally came the day that myself and the others had all been waiting nearly 2 years for the day I was going to Japan! The drive down to Shrewsbury was nerve racking but I was so excited I was practically bouncing up and down as I got out of the car and loaded up the mini-bus. After an emotional goodbye we set off for Birmingham and our long, long plane journey; it was about 22 hours!



After what felt like days we arrived in Japan, it was about 45 degrees - HOT! First stop was Yamanashi where we had Home Hospitality which meant that we would be staying with a Japanese family for 2 nights. My friend and I, Will, stayed with the Uno family and had an amazing taste of Japanese food and culture and we even went to see Mt. Fuji.

After that we travelled on the Bullet train (another new experience!) to the Jamboree site, a place called Yamaguchi, to join the other 40,000 participants. The weather was still in the 40's and some days 50's which when you're sleeping in tents and there is no air conditioning is very hot. The entire campsite was miles long and we had to walk everywhere meaning that the showers were probably my favourite place to be especially after the football tournament against all the different countries. Whilst we were on the site I met lots of interesting people from all over the world – some of which I am still in touch with. We also visited Hiroshima which was a very moving experience.

Finally, before returning, we visited Tokyo for 2 days travelling by Bullet train at 500 kilometres an hour. In Tokyo we saw many sites and ate even more great Japanese food; which after the food on camp felt like a gift from God. I even tried out sumo wrestling! With that over we had a long smelly flight home before checking out of the airport and meeting our families again.

My trip to Japan will stay with me forever as one of the most incredible things I will ever have had the privilege of being a part of. I think it has really helped me mature

more confident. become though and sometimes my parents may think that that's a bad thing. I am very lucky to have been given the opportunity to go and would like to thank everybody who helped me get there with my fundraising. The next jamboree is in 2019 and located at West Virginia, America. I know that this Jamboree will be just as great as mine and I can't wait to hear the stories of the people who go – hopefully one of the younger scouts from our village will be given the same amazing opportunity I was!

The Qube now has six wheelchairs and three mobility scooters of varying sizes which can be hired for as little as an hour or up to several months at a time.
