Hello.

Spring is here, we welcome sunny days and warmer evenings, the daffodils about the village were lovely, and lots of you are out gardening, painting, tidying, getting ready for summer.

St Martins School is being rapidly transformed to accommodate the pupils aged 3 to 11 when they start at "the bottom school" and we are still awaiting the future of Ifton School. It has been there for 100 years, an attractive building, roadside location, we don't know as yet what plans are being considered.

We have had huge investment from Welsh Water and Shropshire Council, to improve our sewers, and surface water drainage (still in progress), but already a massive improvement to reduce any flooding risks through the village, having personally struggled to get Severn Trent and Welsh Water to listen since more than 20 years ago, and other councillors have taken up the baton, thank goodness they finally listened to us, due most recently to our 3 parish water forum, who were tenacious in their pursuit of making Welsh Water listen.

Our broadband improvement plans are in hand (hopefully) and even though we are on a Welsh exchange, we should still benefit from improved broadband speeds, in the programme for an autumn upgrade start.

We will shortly have in place new planters on the railings at the village Memorial, and also a 3 tier planter on the grassed area adjacent to the mini roundabout. New tubs of plants are also being placed at our War Memorial.

We are also committed to going for night time lighting reductions, switching off some lights during night hours, as a cost saving and also reducing night lighting pollution.

I believe this village has risen from the doldrums of the 70s after Ifton Pit closed, to become a village of the future, a 21st century village, with a good community heart, and when we get our recreational facilities, a village people will want to move to.

Finally I would like to thank all the volunteers in our community who give their time

to help others and to provide the organisations that some take for granted, without our volunteers we would not be such a vibrant village with a future.

My wife and I had visited The Keys at St Martins when John and Vicki first started doing food. It was very good. On this visit we were a bit apprehensive as we found the chef had changed. There was no need for apprehension, it was even better!

For starters we chose breaded mushrooms with garlic mayonnaise and home-made pate. Both were generous portions, but the best bit for me was hot toast and above all butter you could spread. None of the half frozen spread you get in some establishments.

For main course we eventually chose from a large selection, salmon with dill sauce and breast of chicken topped with bacon cheese and barbeque sauce. We had difficulty choosing as the menu contained lots of our favourite dishes. Whilst we were eating I noticed (I know you shouldn't look) another customer having the special sizzling dish. It looked wonderful so I now know what I am having next time!

Despite being full up we went greedy and had desserts. We chose home-made amaretto cheesecake and banoffee pie, again very generous portions. We had trouble walking out!

With a glass of wine each the bill came to less than £40.00 All in all, very good value for money. We shall return!

ST MARTINS COMMUNITY FIRST RESPONDERS

John, Effie and Kerry continue to volunteer as Community First Responders in and around St Martins.

It has been a busy start to the year. For those interested in how far we go for 999 jobs, here are our locations for January, February and March 2014:

Oswestry 38, St Martins 33, Gobowen 22, Ellesmere 21, Dudleston Heath 15, Weston Rhyn 10, Whittington 7, and all-these 1 each – Trefonen, Wem, Cockshutt, Rhosygadfa, Gwernybrenin and Selattyn.

The greater majority of the jobs we have been sent to is "FALLS". Sometimes the patient is hurt: many times they are not, but they need help to get up. It's always a relief to arrive at a house where someone has fallen inside, to find a keybox outside and our controller was able to tell us the code to get in. Having to wait for the police to arrive to break in is very frustrating, and it leaves such a mess to be cleared up afterwards! Consider having a keybox – I've got one!

It still comes as a surprise to people that CFRs have to buy all their own kit, uniform, equipment and car! The British Heart Foundation has provided the defibrillators and the ambulance service replaces any bandages, oxygen, etc., which we might use, but the remainder we must buy for ourselves.

Everyone at The Keys pub has continued to support us, however, as has Andrew Foulkes and Stans Superstore. The bag packing we did at Stans just before Mothering Sunday brought in over £500 and we must thank everyone who made a donation to our "pot" on the day. That amount almost covers the insurance on the CFR car for the next year, always a big outlay for us. It has been a super little car, reliable, economical and nippy, and Castle Garage has been a great help sorting out any little problems we have had. It is with some regret that we need to look at replacing it sometime in 2014.

Apart from the 999 jobs, Effie has done a couple of talks to local groups about the work of the CFRs, and shortly John will go to Buckingham Palace to collect his M.B.E. Don't expect him to be wearing it if he shows up when you've called 999 though! Effie Cadwallader CFR RC 1189 St Martins

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Friends of Ifton Meadows



Do you know about the Friends of Ifton Meadows? We are a group of volunteers who work in conjunction with Shropshire County Council to maintain Ifton Meadows Local Nature Reserve. We meet at the main entrance to the Meadows, also known as the Colliery entrance, across the road from the Industrial Estate at 1.30pm on the 2nd Sunday of the month, for

our "Green Gym". This is the opportunity to get some exercise in the open air, by working on tasks to maintain and improve the site. Depending on the time of year, we may be clearing paths, improving areas for butterflies, pulling up ragwort, checking tree guards or carrying out any of the numerous other tasks. Tools are provided, and there are always spares and a warm welcome for new Friends to come and join in.

If there is anyone who hasn't visited Ifton Meadows yet, it is in the Pentre area of St.Martins, reached by following the brown road signs. The main entrance has parking spaces for a few cars and wheelchair access is available with a RADAR key. The key allows the gate to be fully opened outwards, therefore we ask car owners to keep the hatched area on the road clear at all times. A hard surfaced pathway gives access to the viewpoint at the top. Other paths are typically unmade and, though they can be muddy in wet weather, they offer a variety of routes for exploring the site. Cycling and unauthorised motorised vehicles are prohibited on the site. If you bring your dog, please clean up after it. A disposal bin is provided beside the gate.

Ifton Meadows was designated a Local Nature Reserve in 2005. The site covers about 20 hectares (47 acres) and includes a variety of habitats, including semi-ancient woodland and acid grassland. The skylarks are a particularly valued species. These birds are on the Endangered Species list and we are lucky to have them. During their breeding season (March – September) we request visitors to keep off the rough grassland area where they usually nest. In 2013 we recorded 3 breeding pairs who raised 10 juveniles. We hope they have an even more successful season this year.

Report from the Parish Council's April Meeting.

The Chairman welcomed Edward Davies to his first meeting as the new Parish Clerk who had taken over from Sue Crow.

Members expressed concern over possible fracking in Dudleston Heath. Shropshire Councillor Steve Davenport said the first he heard about this was when he read it in the press. However this was for extracting methane gas which already had planning permission granted in 2010. This was just a renewal of that application. There would be a public meeting on this. Councillor John Stevens stressed the need that St Martin's people are also invited to this meeting.

A Member asked for an update on the highway changes around the school entrance. Shropshire Councillor Steve Davenport said that a plan is being drawn up now which should include a light controlled pedestrian crossing, wider footpaths, cycle path and mini roundabout. All this work was planned to be completed before the school opens in September 2014.

On planning matters, Members considered an outline application for the erection of two further dwellings at 8a Moors Lane. It was resolved that the Parish Council strongly objects to this application on the following grounds; the site is outside the village boundary; this would now be an over development of the site; the Parish Councils SAMDev. response states no further development in Moors Lane; the land & access are prone to surface water flooding; effect on the right of way to the coal yard business (access may be compromised) with ownership of this access road in dispute as we believe that the applicant does not own the whole access road; additional traffic on a narrow no through lane will cause problems; there is a pond on the site, are there newts?; concern over close proximity to canal and how will the accumulated site surface water be dealt with. In any event the Parish Council also request that an application for Tree Preservation Orders is placed on all trees on this site.

The Parish Council resolved to create a Recreation Services Committee to come into existence with effect from the Annual meeting of the Council in May 2014. In addition to Members from the Parish Council it was suggested that up to five local organisations are approached to appoint their own representatives on this committee. These could include the Parish Plan group, Friends of Ifton Meadows, Footballers, Guides & Scouts, Schools and Local Businesses.

Some ideas put forward to commemorate the Centenary of the First World War included attaching large poppies on the street lights along the main road although the parish. Council would need Shropshire Council permission on this. Shropshire Councillor Steve Davenport suggested the grassed area outside the school, set back from the highway, would be an ideal location for a tree and plaque plus a walled area around it with bricks donated from the school. Again the Parish Council would need Shropshire Council permission for this.

Our Sunday FIRST Family Worship Service takes place on the 1st sunday of every month at 11.00am. It is a half hour service with music story and prayer and afterwards we go into the hall for coffee, cake and some craft activities. This service is popular with all ages but is great for young children and their parents.

Weddings

St. Martins Parish Church is one of the most beautiful and serene buildings you could find for such an occasion. A grade 1 listed building with more than a 1000 year tradition of marrying people. There are many ways you can make your wedding special for you. Getting married adds that spiritual dimension to your relationship as well a sense of security to your family life. God's blessing on their life together is the main attraction for many couples, whatever their beliefs.

It doesn't have to cost too much.

After the legal fees for a church wedding (about £450*) the other big five wedding expenses are usually the reception, the engagement ring, the wedding dress, photography and video, and the honeymoon, which together normally take up about 75% of the wedding budget. Keep these five under tight control and you can have a unique and special day with breaking the bank. See the Church of England website for ideas.

The St. Martins FOODBANK is open every week, part of the Oswestry and Borders Foodbank network - feeding local people in crisis.

Wednesday - 10:30am -12:30pm.

13 million people live below the poverty line in the UK. Oswestry and Borders Foodbank provides a minimum of 3 days emergency food to local people in crisis.

How a foodbank works

- Food is donated

Schools, churches, businesses and individuals donate non-perishable, in-date food to the foodbank.

- Food is sorted and stored

Volunteers sort food to check that it's in date and pack it into boxes ready to be given to people in need.

- Frontline care professionals identify people in need

Care professionals such as social workers, Sure Start, Children In Need, local school staff, CAB, Shropshire Housing Alliance, Shropshire Family Information Service and Victim Support identify people in crisis and issue them with a foodbank voucher.

- Clients receive food

Foodbank clients bring their voucher to a foodbank centre where it can be redeemed for three days emergency food. Volunteers meet clients over a cup of tea and are able to signpost people to agencies able to solve the longer-term problem.

If you find yourself in difficulty (and it can happen to us all) and you do not have a foodbank voucher - please come on a Wednesday and talk to us and we can help.

Other news from the Parish Church.

On going repairs are taking place on the clock which sadly is still having problems with its old mechanism. Our Organ will be having a clean and rebuild paid for by the church league of friends, (thank you). This should mean the instrument should be able to be used for many years to come.

Church Grave Yard.

Thank you to all those who take time to clear and care for the memorial sites in this sacred place. The Church Council do appreciate people taking their litter home and would like to thank those who cut the grass. If you have the time and a lawnmower and would like to help with the difficult job of cutting grass around the various graves then we would like to hear from you. A new fence will also be made


at the back to separate the area from the cars.



Property Sale Pitfalls



Selling property can be a harrowing experience, particularly if this is only done once or twice in a lifetime. The process over recent years has changed dramatically; gone are the handwritten deeds and all the useful information that those documents contain. All

is now covered with a single document called the Land Registration Certificate. Compulsory registration has been in place now for some time so the question of who owns what can now easily be ascertained by a quick online search. You may think this has made life much easier when it comes to selling, not so, a whole host of new regulations and certificates are now required.

Firstly, an Energy Performance Certificate will need to be prepared for your property. These are generally not expensive but something your estate agent obtains before putting your property on the market. When a buyer has been found a series of questions will be asked by your solicitor ie the enquires before contract detailing general matters about the property. For example, if your property is listed you will be asked whether any repairs or improvements have taken place and if so you will be asked for the listed building consent for these. Even if your property is not listed and you have replaced a window in the house in recent years a FENSA certificate will be required. I still regularly find householders have no idea that such a certificate even exists.

Many people in rural areas have private water supplies and the solicitor acting for the purchaser will ask whether your private water supply from a spring or a well has been tested. There lies the problem. Invariably, water you have been drinking for years does not pass the stringent tests, although I have also had experience of mains water from the tap failing the test.

Boundary disputes are always a thorny problem, particularly when the Land Registry certificate plan differs from what is on site, this problem can hold up or prejudice a sale. Having your property registered in advance of sale is really the order of the day.

Now pertinent to the St Martins area is the successful new sewerage situation that has been achieved in the village. However, there are those within the area that do not have access to the mains sewer and still have a septic tank. Here we have 'The Environmental Permitting (England and Wales Regulations 2010) regulations are a real party stopper. In essence, the regulations seek along with other matters to require registration of any discharge from a septic tank as well as controlling any discharge from a household direct into the water course. The requirement to

register your foul disposal system is brought about by the Environment Agency and DEFRA as part of the implementation of the European Framework Directive. This can be checked on the Environment Agency website and interestingly the Environment Agency states these regulations provide the 'lightest touch approach to meet these European obligations', we have not heard this one before. In practice registration only needs to be undertaken once and providing it is successful you obtain exemption and the need to hold an environmental permit to discharge from a septic tank.

In the course of my work a number of homeowners have asked me whether they need to register their drainage system and generally the first thing I say is are you sure you have a septic tank and not a cesspit as these do not need to be registered as there is no outfall or discharge. I am sure there are many people who have absolutely no idea they need to register. In fact in my experience many people have no idea what actually happens after the discharge leaves the bathroom and most probably do not really want to know. Some may say, 'forget about it' and the problem will go away, experience has shown that it is not necessarily going to go away, it may go quiet but when you sell your property the contract will ask whether or not the drainage is to the main sewer or a septic tank. Then following your disclosure you will be asked whether the discharge has an exemption certificate and if you hold a permit for the discharge. Yet another part of the selling process which can be frustrating and delay the selling process.

In conclusion therefore, if you are contemplating selling make sure you consider what certificates you require, if in doubt discuss this with your solicitor or your chosen agent and the process should run smoothly.

Grow It, Make It, Show It, Show

It's that time again....

The sun is out – and wonderful to feel it's warmth on our skin. But the press is full of articles about skin cancer.

What is skin cancer? There are three kinds of skin cancer.

- 1) Melanoma.
- 2) Basal cell Carcinoma.
- 3) Squamous cell carcinoma. .

Only the first two are related to sun exposure. Melanoma cancers are the **least** common form of cancer but the most serious. It is the one most likely to spread (and ultimately kill) and is the second most common in young people aged 15-34. This is the one I will concentrate on.

To **identify** melanomas we use **ABCD**: **A**symmetry (Uneven, unlike a regular mole which is usually round and even); **B**order (often ragged or

blurred), **C**olour (often mixed, frequently 2-3 shades of brown);

Diameter (normally bigger than a normal mole – and continues to grow).

However, not all melanomas are dark. Some may bleed,

or itch.

To **prevent** melanomas, avoid the sun between 11am and 3pm; Cover up with clothes and wide brimmed hats. Use skin protection – at least SPF15 for adults and 30 for those with pale skin. It's particularly important to protect children as excessive exposure to sun in childhood is thought to be the biggest risk factor for developing skin cancer in adulthood.

To **treat** skin cancer – see your GP if you have worrying signs. The NHS has a fast track way of assessing skin problems and soon will be able to tell you whether that worrisome mole is of concern or not.

Enjoy the sun – safely.


A BOOK GROUP IN ST MARTINS?

WESTON RHYN GARDENERS' CLUB

John Millington of Hillview Hardy Plants, based in Worfield, Bridgnorth gave a colourful presentation on 'Primulas and Auriculas' at the May meeting.

Primulas, known to most of us in its wild form, the Primrose (primula vulgaris), are plants originally from the Himalayas. Known for their range of rainbow colours, lush green foliage and scent brightening up the gardens in early Spring, primulas are easy to propagate by division.

There are many varieties – from doubles that used to be picked and sent to be sold in Covent Garden, to Victorian primulas that are enjoying a revival like the gold-laced polyanthus. The variety Guinevere has dark purple leaves and pink flowers, Schneekissen (snow cushion) is tiny at 1" high with sweetly scented white flowers. A tough polyanthus that was once used for municipal planting is now available to all. Called Crescendo, it is a tall-stemmed variety which is ideal as a cut flower. The elegant candelabra primulas make a stunning display alongside streams and in damp areas of the garden.

Although Auriculas look very exotic, the border varieties are tough enough for the garden and easy to grow, especially Royal Velvet which has frilled petals. The flowers look like overlapping discs of colour in the single types, but there are doubles that are not good outside as the rain settling on the flowers can soon spoil the petals. There are alpine versions with cream or gold centres, the colour shading from dark to light from the centre. Other types include show self, edges (black body, green edges), fancies (any colour that's not black) and stripes (an Edwardian fashion). Auriculas can be propagated by seed sown now and dividings (in Autumn).

There is no meeting in June. July's presentation is 'Carnivorous Plants in Cultivation/Wild' by Mike King on 9th in the Weston Rhyn Institute at 7.30 p.m. All visitors welcome.


In September this year the centre hopes to offer 2 separate classes; **Spanish for beginners** and **Spanish for improvers.** There is a class just waiting for you.
